HOBO HABITS.

New Tramps Bent Railway Trains and Beg Lunches.

"The commonest way to beat trains," says a professional tramp, "is to get into an empty box car, but on some western roads one would make slow time if he relied on empties alone. Hoboes are close students of car architecture. Refrigerators and cattle cars furnish many hiding places. Even the commonest games, such as springing doors of sealed freight cars and riding on top of passenger cars, would make a long list.
