DYNAMITE EXPLOSION

Breaks Nearly Every Window in the Town of Bracebridge.

Four Cases, Ignited by a Grass Fire, Cause a Terrific Explosion, which Was Heard For Many Miles Distant—Dynamite Was For Blasting Government Road—Fortunately There Was No Loss of Life.

Bracebridge, Muskoka, June 4.—A tremendous explosion occurred at 3 o'clock Saturday evening, when several buildings were shattered and many windows throughout the town, especially on the main business street, were broken.

Four cases of dynamite in a building at the wharf were ignited by a fire which burned in the grass on the hill leading to the lake all day. The explosion was terrific. It was heard many miles distant.

The dynamite was for blasting out the Government road leading to the wharf.

Fortunately no one was close enough to the explosion to be injured. The stable of Hugh Anderson was wrecked.

Among the buildings which suffered considerably from broken windows were the house of Dr. Williams, the Court House and the Dominion Hotel.

Nearly every place of business on Main street was similarly damaged.

Nine Killed in Trolley Wreck.

Providence, R. I., June 4.—Nine persons were killed and twenty injured through the overturning of a large trolley car on the Rhode Island Co.'s line at Moore's Corner, East Providence, just after 1 o'clock Saturday morning. Many of the victims of the accident were of English birth and were employed in the British Hosiery Co.'s mill and other textile factories at Thornton.

Engine Through Open Draw.

New York, June 4.—One of the most remarkable railway accidents that ever happened near this city just missed being a disaster at the Pennsylvania Railroad's newest steel drawbridge over the Hackensack River, a few minutes after 2 p.m. Saturday. The St. Louis Express, speeding toward Jersey City, reached the bridge as the draw was opening. The locomotive ran across the draw and fell into the river. Its tender, two drawing-room coaches and a dining car were wrecked on the bridge. Not one of the persons on the train was hurt. The nine passengers who were in the two wrecked drawing-room coaches were transferred to the day coaches and finished the trip with a delay of only a half hour.

Forty-Two Were Killed.

Result of Mexican and American Race Riot at Cananea.

Bisbee, Arizona, June 4.—Latest advice from Cananea, Mexico, where a race riot raged Friday, following a strike of the Mexican miners at the Greene Consolidated Copper Mines, says the situation at Cananea last night was normal. The American volunteers, who went across the line at Naco, with Governor Ysabel of Sonora, on Saturday morning, returned to Bisbee yesterday morning. Their services were no longer needed, although their presence there during Saturday before the arrival of Col. Kosterlitzky with Mexican rurales, held the situation in check.

The town is now under martial law and Col. Kosterlitzky is disarming Americans and Mexicans alike. A telephone message yesterday says that shots have been fired since Saturday afternoon at 6 o'clock. Col. Kosterlitzky and Governor Ysabel, assisted by Gen. Torres, are on the ground, and Col. Greene, chief owner of the Cananea copper mine, makes the statement that the trouble is over.

A conservative estimate of the number killed in the two days' fighting is 36 Mexicans and six Americans.

The trouble arose over the demand of the Mexicans for an increase in wages from \$3.50 to \$5 per day. The population of Cananea is 23,000, of which 5,000 are Americans.
