HEALTH BOARD

Businesslike Session of the Members Yesterday-Officers' Reports.

A meeting of the city Board of Health was held yesterday afternoon in Harrison Hall with chairman Dr. Charteris, Chas. Hadley, W. S. Richards, Dr. R. V. Bray, Health Officer Dr. W. R. Hall, W. R. Baxter and Inspector Anson Mounteer present.
The meeting was a short and business-like one for even the Health Board.

Board.

A report was read from Health Officer Dr. Hall regarding the establishment of an isolation hospital for contagious diseases and, as a result, the Chairman and the Health Officer were appointed a committee to go in to matter theroughly, with power. The report was as follows:

To the Chairman and members of the Chairman local Board of Health:

Health:
The Inspector's report covers contagious diseases for the past month, except the difficulty of finding place for isolation of cases. The General Hospital contagious department was occupied by scarlet fever cases, and St. Joseph's Hospital contagious department has been abolished, so we had no place to send diphtheria cases. I recommend that the matter of procuring proper hospital accommodation for contagious cases be again concuring proper hospital accommodation for contagious cases be again considered. The authorities of St. Joseph's Hospital are ready to enter into an arrangement with the city to build and maintain a contagious disease department if suitable arrangements or terms are offered. The General Hospital, too, are ready to enter into an arrangement.

General Hospital, too, are ready to enter into an arrangement.

I would suggest that the city pay as a bonus to each of the hospitals ar annual amount sufficient to cover interest on money expended, which would not otherwise yield a revenue, the amount to be determined by mutual agreement, and that the hospital agrees in return to properly mutual agreement, and that the hospital agrees in return to properly maintain and equip suitable building, etc., and extend to cases paid for by the city a specially low weekly rate. An arrangement could be made which I believe would be to the advantage of all concerned and much cheaper to the city than building, equipping and maintaining a building of their own.
