Fair Play. The prosperity of any town depends largely upon the prosperity of its merchants, and the prosperity of the merchants depends on the patronage of its citizens, hence then the imperative duty of the citizens is to deal with local merchants.

We have a thriving town and it would seem that every citizen would do his utmost to add to its prosperity and financial status. What then can be thought of such citizens who, for the sake of saving as they think, a few cents, will give their patronage to merchants in the Upper Provinces?

We have been creditably informed that foremost among such unpatriotic and injurious citizens may be classed one who holds a government position and derives his support entirely from the taxes paid provincial pockets. Not only does he send his own money away but tries to induce others to do the same. We judge the prayers of such a seemingly devout resident for the general welfare of our citizens are shown to be hypocritical and inefficient, when he, the next day perhaps, does what must hinder such prosperity and thus render such prayers ineffectual.

If better terms could be secured abroad I fall to see how any foreign merchant who literally cares nothing for you, except to get your cash before you ever see your goods, can give such terms as your local merchant. Quality governs the price, and taking this as a criterion, we know of none who will use you as well as your own merchant. This being the case it is not the duty of all patriotic citizens to spend their money at home and thus build up the prosperity of their own town? But if such citizens must do this surely it is a double crime to try to induce others to do the same. To induce another to do a wrong is worse than to do it oneself.

We expect great things from our town in the future and to make it bright and prosperous let us spend our money in our midst, and thus by our actions prove our sincerity and our faith in our future welfare, and our desire to help secure it.

As the ancient Roman felt and acted as if his highest duty was to promote the welfare of his State, and if he had to die for it, so, in a greater sense, should we, who are more highly enlightened and profess to be guided by nobler motives, do our utmost to make the most of our fair town. King's Co. Agricultural Society. The 105th annual meeting of the above society was held on Tuesday, Nov. 6th, in the Evangelical Hall, Grand Pr. Owing to the disagreeable condition of the weather the attendance was not large. Officers for the ensuing year were elected as follows:

President—Thos. Tuso. Vice President—Rev. Wm. Brown. Secretaries—George Hamilton and H. Chipman. Directors—A. G. Goodacre, I. N. Faller, W. C. Trenholm, C. F. Patterson and Wm. Mortimer.

A circular was read from the Trust, board of trade, advocating united action in petitioning the legislature to repeal the act passed in 1892, which fixes the place of holding the Provincial Exhibition in the city of Halifax. After an animated discussion the following resolution was unanimously passed:
