Death's Harvest.

Citizens were shocked and grieved to learn on Sunday last of the death of Mr. Andrew Johnson, one of the best known and most highly esteemed residents of the town. Only a few days the news of his passing away came with a shock to the community of which he had so long been a resident and where so many regarded him as a friend.

Mr. Johnson was a son of the late William Johnson and was born in Wolfville July 26th, 1836. He was the last surviving member of a family which has filled a very important place in this community. With the exception of a few years spent in Falmouth he has resided all his long life time in Wolfville. He was an enthusiastic orchardist, a consistent member of the Baptist church, an ardent Conservative. A charter member of Wolfville Division, S. of T., he maintained his membership until the end of the sixtieth anniversary of the society in December he was present and took part in the proceedings.

The deceased is survived by his wife, who, previous to her marriage, was Miss Olivia Church, daughter of the late Biletha Church, of Falmouth, and one daughter, Mrs. Pelton, who resides in the United States.

The funeral on Tuesday afternoon was well attended. The floral offerings were pretty and the emblem of the Sons of Temperance was placed on the casket. Rev. Dr. Gates conducted the service, being assisted by Rev. W. H. Rackham. The interment was in Willow Bank Cemetery.
