## PREPARING FOR RED CROSS CARNIVAL

Many Novel Features are Being Provided for This Year's Carnival, Which is to be Held in the Comox Road Park.

The Carnival which the Red Cross Society are preparing for the 11th and 12th of next month, promises to have some very novel and interesting features which, though the affair as a whole may not be as extensive as that which was held last year, will probably make it not one whit less enjoyable.

This year the carnival proper is to be held in the pavilion on the Comox Road park, it being felt that since there is no vaudeville entertainment in connection with it this year, this building will be large enough to accommodate all the stalls comfortably. Then too, the surroundings at the park are certainly far more attractive than those at the Agricultural Society's grounds, where the carnival was held last year, and on a hot September evening should offer a delightful change from the sweeter of the streets in the more populous parts of the city.

As usual with Red Cross carnivals the parade will be the main feature of the opening day. While there is no costume in the world which can set off feminine charms to greater effect than that of a Red Cross nurse, it is rumored that the future has in store for us something unique and strikingly effective in the matter of costumes, which will throw the traditional nurses' habiliments quite into the shade and that moreover the lady who has charge of this portion of the Carnival has made wise selection of her assistants exercising a most exacting choice in her search for personal beauty in those she has invited to help her. Since however, strict silence has been enjoined on all who are even remotely connected with this part of the entertainment it is manifestly impossible at the present time to do more than throw out vague hints that there is something quite out of the ordinary pending.

In the park itself there will be no lack of amusement while the several stall holders are working their fingers off in the endeavor to provide all and sundry with something which they may carry away as a souvenir of the Carnival of 1918. The fancy work stall will be in charge of Mrs. Mercer, the Misses Gillespie and Rogers will conduct the raffles, the Misses Pollard and Lawrence will have a profusion of flowers, fresh at all hours of the day. Mrs. Eriandson and her assistants will provide those in search of refreshment with tea and other forms of light refreshments, while Mr. H. Bates will look after the amusements on the fair grounds. The stall devoted to soldiers' comforts will be in charge of Mrs. Davidson, while the children's booth will be in the hands of Mesdames Crawford and Ford. Miss Ingham will conduct a parcels post stall, and Mesdames Randle and B. C. Wyles will have charge of the plain sewing stall. Mrs. Horne will dispense ice cream and soft drinks to those desiring cooling refreshment, and the advertising campaign in which most of the wholesale houses of the province are taking part is in charge of Mrs. Kelsey. So that it will be seen that there is likely to be no lack of entertainment for all and sundry.

In the evening of both days there will be entertainments of various descriptions provided, with a dance to bring the Carnival to a conclusion.
