Tuberculosis Lecture by Dr. Rendell.
 Taking as his subject "Some odds and ends connected with Tuberculosis," Dr. Rendell lectured last night in the British Hall before a large and deeply interested audience. He described the nature of the disease, how it poisoned the system and demonstrated how poison was produced by germs and exemplified their actions on the human system and lungs. He also told how nature endeavored to heal and dealt also with the questions of climate, food, colds and draughts. The latter were often designated "Goblin's Damm'd" and with good reason. The lecturer laid particular stress on the changes of temperature in nature, which brought about sudden changes of temperature and gave valuable hints as to diet and the values of the various kinds of foods. Consumption will be treated more successfully in a northern than a southern climate. The Doctor's discourse was a learned treatise on the "Great White Plague," from which much benefit must be derived. Sir William Horwood proposed a vote of thanks to the learned lecturer at the close which was carried by acclamation.

B.I.S. Anniversary.

Anxious About Rev. S. J. Pike
 It is to be hoped that the Rev. S. J. Pike, Methodist Parsonage of Bay Bulls Arms, will turn up safely, although there is good reason for very grave anxiety about his welfare. The Rev. gentleman left Mr. Murphy's house, at Come-By-Chance on February 6th and has not been heard of or seen since February 7th. He joined the train on his way to Norman's Cove, and leaving her at Long Harbor, started on the seven mile tramp to finish his journey. The weather was severe at the time, and anxiety is all the greater because of the fact that Mr. Pike was ill at the time. A message has been sent to the Relieving Officer at New Harbor to endeavor to locate Mr. Pike, but up to the time of writing, nothing has been heard from him. Mr. Pike is a young man who is very devoted to his duties, and has earned a reputation in his pastorate for earnestness, hard work and sympathy with his people. We can only hope that nothing untoward has happened to this promising young man.

Since writing the above, we have been informed by the Colonial Secretary, that the Rev. gentleman had left Norman's Cove on February 13th for Collier's Bay Cove, and, although nothing is known of his present whereabouts, we may assume that he is all right.

Death of Mr. William Duff.
 The many of our citizens who knew and respected Mr. Wm. Duff, of Carbonear, were filled with sorrow this morning on learning of his death at Carbonear. Mr. Duff was a prominent figure in business, social and legislative circles in Newfoundland for many long years and was most popular not alone amongst Carbonear folk but also amongst the people of St. John's and of the whole Colony. Mr. Duff was born at Bothkennar, Strirlingshire, Scotland, in 1842 and came to Newfoundland in 1858 entering the firm of Patterson & Foster, where he remained for several years until he went into business on his own behalf and organized the firm of Duff and Balmer. This well known house lasted for about 25 years when the firm of Duff & Sons succeeded it. The deceased was married to a sister of the late Mr. John Patterson, who with 3 sons, Messrs. John, Robert and William Duff and 3 daughters one of whom is Mrs. Simpson, wife of Rev. Mr. Simpson. Mr. Duff had been ill only a short while and death was caused by pneumonia. Last year Mr. Duff passed through the trying experience of having his right arm amputated, but recovered and afterwards enjoyed good health. A man of kindly parts, genial and friendly it is no wonder that his demise has caused such widespread regret. In his younger days he was an athlete and a splendid marksman and few could equal him as a shot. When handling his rifle he bore the sobriquet of "Danger Duff," as he was sure to beat all competitors. To the sorrowing family the Telegram extends its sincere sympathy.

Death of W Sullivan.
 The death occurred at his residence, Carter's Hill, this morning, of Mr. Wm. Sullivan, a well known and highly respected citizen. Mr. Sullivan was for the past thirty-five years foreman baker in the bakery of A. J. Harvey & Co., and was respected and liked by his employers and those associated with him in the bakery. Mr. Sullivan succumbed to an illness of three months' duration. The deceased, who is a brother of Inspector General Sullivan, is survived by a widow, one daughter and five sons, to whom the Telegram extends its condolence.

Violations of Game Laws.
 At Brigus, on the 11th inst., Thomas Mackinson, of the Goulds, was before Magistrate Thompson on a charge of being on the shooting grounds with dog and gun on September 12th last. He was convicted and fined \$10 and costs, or in default 14 days' imprisonment. The fine was paid. Mr. Mackinson was also charged for hunting on the same date. This charge was dismissed owing to insufficient evidence that he actually went on the grounds for the purpose of hunting. James Howe, of the Goulds, who was subpoenaed as a witness in the case, did not appear and a warrant was issued for his arrest. The case was postponed from noon on February 11th until the afternoon, at 4 p.m. When the witness appeared he was fined \$5 for contempt of court. This amount was paid.

Kite is Safe.
REPORTED AT TRINITY.
 Friends of those on board the sealing steamer Kite will be glad to learn that she has turned up safely. To-day Messrs. Bowring Bros. had a message from her captain saying that the vessel reached Trinity at 9.20 a.m. to-day, but did not say in what condition. The owners have wired Capt. Yetman for more particulars. The Kite left here with her sealing equipment on board three weeks ago, and proceeded to Wesleyville. She left there for Conche, from which port she will clear for the northern sealfishery on March 11th. She was absent 15 days without reporting anywhere, and it is now believed that she got caught in the heavy jam of ice, and when the ice loosened she was driven south, which accounts for her arrival at Trinity.

George Street Church UNITED SERVICES.
