Cobourg, Ont., July 28.—Mrs. Perrin an elderly lady, was instantly killed and Mrs. Wm. Kerr and Mrs. Brown were injured in a collision between a shunting engine and an automobile on the Grand Trunk Railway crossing at University Avenue, Cobourg, on Sunday afternoon.

The engine, running from the ferry docks, emerged suddenly from behind the car shops between the ferry dock and the station, and struck the automobile broadside, throwing the five occupants out. The car shops obstruct the view from the direction in which the automobile was approaching and crossing, and the survivors of the accident maintain further, that the engines whistle was not blown. In addition to those above named were Mr. and Mrs. Dawson, who escaped injury. Mrs. Perrin, the woman who was killed, was Mrs. Dawson's mother, and Mrs. Brown was Mrs. Perrin's sister.

Rain.

Rain is a popular variety of extreme wetness which attains its greatest popularity about the first of August, when the parched lips of the corn crop can be seen from the rear seat of an automobile. The weather bureau speaks of it as precipitation and measures it by the square inch. It is estimated that one inch of thick and contiguous rainfall is worth a million dollars to any country with an annual mean precipitation of four pints.

For a great many years the process of manufacturing rain was a great mystery to the birthplace of Darwin's original ape. People used to think it was caused by two clouds trying to pass on the same track, producing a heavy and sustained leakage which could be felt at every Sunday school picnic which happened to be located near the right way. The ancients believed that rain was a sorcerer weeping spell on the part of some goddess who would rather be back on earth, riding around in a tube skirt. The ancients did not maintain anybody to guess on the weather at \$5,000 per year. Hence they never knew when it was going to rain until they had walked into some of it in the form of a mud puddle.

In states where they do not have enough rain in one year to crowd a quart cup the farmers make their own precipitation with an irrigation pump. In some localities all of the precipitation is in the hands of a stock company, which rents it out by the barrel with dividends.
