Girls' Night School Has Re-Opened.

The classes in reading and writing, conducted by the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Girls' Department, were resumed at the Seamen's Institute last night. Thirteen young women presented themselves, and from 8 to 9 o'clock lessons were given by Mrs. (Hon.) W. C. Job, President of the Auxiliary; Mrs. (Hon.) J. Harvey; Mrs. J. Mitchell; Misses Farlong and Hayward.

The classes will be conducted every Tuesday night during the winter months, and everything for the use of the pupils will be supplied free of charge. This affords an opportunity to working girls to get an elementary education, and applies particularly to domestics employed here, who may not have had these advantages in the outports from which they have come.

Last year thirty-three pupils attended all through the season and the progress made was very gratifying to themselves and their instructors, to whom much praise is due for the interest they have taken in their work.

Fishery Reports.

On Oct. 3rd.—From W. J. White, (Aquafor to Caplin Bay).—The total catch is 4,975 quintals and for last week 180. The dories and skiffs did nothing during this week owing to stormy weather. Six boats returned from the grounds with 180 qts. for five days fishing.

Oct. 3rd.—From J. Gosse (Spaniard's Bay to Upper Island Cove).—No traps, dories or skiffs, but 54 boats are fishing. Only 8 qts. were landed this week. There is a little cod on the grounds, but no bait. The Flona, Butt, arrived from the Straits with 400 qts., taken at Wilcox Arm. She reports the weather poor for making fish. At Fortune on Saturday night a fierce storm raged from N. E. with snow. Sch. Lady Thorburn drove ashore but was refloated after the storm.

Oct. 3rd.—From W. White, (Port Rexton to Trinity).—Prospects are poor and the weather is very stormy. There is plenty of squid some days, but it is uncertain. No fish was taken this week by the shoremen owing to the rough weather. The total catch is 13,900 with 1,900 for last week. This latter was landed by schooner which arrived from Labrador. Only 60 punts are fishing.

The S. S. Morwenna was expected to get away from Sydney at noon to-day for this port.

LETTER TO HIS EXCELLENCY.

The Rectory, Forestville, Prince George's County, Maryland, Sept. 21st, 1914.

His Excellency Sir W. E. Davidson, K.C.M.G., Governor of Newfoundland and Dependencies.

Your Excellency,—I have just learned from the Newfoundland papers that you are raising a Regiment of Newfoundland boys for active service in the big war now being waged in Europe, and I am prompted to ask if you need a Chaplain for the troops that you will accept my services as a volunteer for the duty.

I have been living in the United States now for ten years as Rector of the Episcopal Church of the Epiphany, Forestville, P. G. C., Maryland, but I am of British birth. My father was a West Country Devonshire viking my mother a Healer, one removed from the old sod; so I am half English, half Irish, the best mixture of blood in the world.

In years, I am not a young man, but I am young in constitution, health, strength and activity; sound in mind and limb, and in Newfoundland and on Labrador for more than forty years of missionary life. I went through the rough training which would fit me for the exposure and hardships of campaigning.

I shall be truly glad and supremely happy if I can be accepted for the service of the land of my fathers in the capacity of Chaplain, since I am debared by my calling from shouldering the rifle or drawing the sword.

I shall be most grateful if your Excellency will give me a reply as soon as possible so that I may make the preparations necessary if I am accepted.
