1. To augment, if possible, the resources of the familes of Volunteers unable to adequately maintain them-

2. To assist, if possible, men invalid ed from active service until they can secure employment, or until the State makes provision for them by pension

3. To assist, if posible, widows and other dependents of those who lose their lives while on active service. until they become the beneficiaries of legislative enactment.

4. To afford help, if possible, in suc cases as do not come within the scope ity of the public.




