BRILLIANT ADVANCE OF RUSSIANS. — TURKISH ARMIES IN PRECARIOUS POSITION.

PETROGRAD, To-day. The Russians are pressing the advantage gained in Erzerum, on both flanks. On the right along the Black Sea Coast by the co-operation of sea and land forces they are driving the Turks from one position after another to the East of Trebizond, and it is extended that action against the important to the East of Trebizond, and it is expected that action against the important seaport will not be long deferred. In the last two days the Russians have occupied Widje and pressed forward ten or twelve miles westward. The iffeet destroyed in succession several shore batteries, which might have been of assistance to the Turks by keeping well in advance of the land forces and by destroying bridges over several streams in the path of the retreating Turks, they rendered the retreating Turks, they rendered the retreat more difficult. The fleet has been working so close to the shore

that warships have been reached by rifle fire from Turkish troops. On the other hand the ships have spread con-fussion in the ranks of the Turks by fussion in the ranks of the Turks by dropping shells among them. On the left fiank after the occupation of Koph the Russians pushed on to Mush and left, the latter on the north shore of Lake Van. From Koph to Mush is 60 miles over mountain roads, they fought several battles and occupied Mush by storm. The Turks fied southward towards Diarbeke the next objective of the Russian army. Once in possession of Diarbeke, it is only a few days march to the Bagdad rail-

possession of Diarbeke, it is only a few days march to the Bagdad railway, the last remaining communication into Syria. The rapid Russian offensive beyond Erzerum is believed here to make probable the retreat of Turkish Corps operating along the Black Sea Coast. These troops which were active in the Mush district before the Russians occupied it will be entirely cut off from the main Turkish armies and will be surrounded. This fate has already overtaken the thirtyfate has already overtaken the thirty-fourth division of the tenth corps which was ordered from Oiti to Erzewhich was ordered from Oiti to Erzerum before the fall of the fortress. As telephonic communication between this group of Turkish forces and the garrison at Erzerum had been entirely destroyed by the Russians, the thirty-fourth division marched serenly into Erzerum without suspicion that the fortress was then on the point of surrender. These troops reached Erzerum from north-west, the very moment the Deve Boina line forts fell ment the Deve Boina line forts fell into the Russian hands, and the army which it had come to assist was in full retreat and the road over which they had passed was instantly occupied by Russian Cavalry. As they were completely surrounded, there was no alternative but surrender with arms, equipment and artillery. It is regarded almost as inevitable that the Turkish corps retiring along the Black Sea Coast, under the destructive fire of the Russian fleet and the pressure of the Russian armies will be caught in the same sort of trap, as the Turkish troops falling back from Widge to Mush Knansh, still have greater dis-tance to go than the Russian troops, which is advancing from Erzerum to cut them off. On the Turkish right flank, where the ninth corps is operat-ing the Turks find themselves in the same precarious position since all roads of retreat north are gradually falling under Russian control. The re-treat of the Turkish armies is everywhere impeded by deep snow. They are without food and lack of war supplies. There seems to be little possi-bility of their offering even temporary resistance of any strength to the Rus-

PAPER BOY KILLED.


