

SOUND CURRENCY.

LONDON, Jan. 21. A new organization called "Sound Currency Association," has been formed here to aid in eliminating inflated currency and to resume the pound sterling to its par value and return to the gold standard. The first meeting was attended by bankers, economics and members of parliament.
