The fact of an entry having been forced was first discovered at 3 o'clock this morning by Constables O'Neill and White, of the night watch, when they found the front door broken. Mr. Stafford was called from his home and upon examination discovered the loss. The store had been ransacked, the cash register (from which the \$40 was taken) broken open, and the private desk forced. A half-full bottle of rum was found on the counter. This was perhaps a bottle which the visitors had broached and (knowing that they had lots more) getting broad-minded and generous, they decided to leave it for the store owners. This was commendable politeness, and proves the culture of the midnight entrants. A large stone, with which the window had been broken, was found. Some match stubs, also, were left behind. Just East of Deady's Lane, the police found the "remains" of a bottle of kick, and a strong odor pervading the night air. Here, again, is evidence of the marauders' kindness. Not having time to offer a drink, they left a reminder for passers-by. (All this morning there was a vast crowd about the spot, and many spectators went home lamenting that they had got nothing more than a sniff, while others, who came later, did not get even that. By now, however, the odor has been completely inhaled and not a smell remains.) The police are busily engaged on the case, and it is the hope that they will soon lay the burglars by the heels.


