The Dominion Iron and Steel Co. is undertaking the sale of Bell Island ore in the European market. Arrange ments have been made for the shipment of some 24,000 tons to Middle boro, England. A 6,000 ton cargo steamer is at present en route to Sydney for the first shipment, and three others will follow. Heretofore the Dominion Company used all the ore mined, at their own plant, in the manufacture of steel.
