The Competition of Government.

At the luncheon given on the S.S. Silvia, the new ship of the Red Cross Line, at Halifax recently, one of the speakers, Hon. A. K. McLean M.P., expressed the hope that before long the Canadian Government as a ship operator would retire from business. His remark, we observe, was warmly applauded, and by none we suspect more warmly than those connected with the Red Cross steamers, for they as well as other privately operated steamship lines in Canada, have greatly suffered from the injustice of the Government's competition.

The Red Cross Line has been in service a long time and its record is a good one. It provides a direct connection between St. John's Nfld., Halifax, and New York, which is satisfactory to importers and exporters both in Canada and Newfoundland, whether traffic is at the peak or in the depression it carries on to the great benefit of both St. John's and Halifax.

Now it might have been thought that a line such as this, which received no Canadian subsidy and which in normal times was not burdened with an excess of either freight or passenger traffic, would have been immune from the competition of the Government ships, for obviously the services rendered being beneficial to Canada as well as to Newfoundland, it would seem to be unfair to do anything which might be regarded as an interference with its profits. But not so. The C.G.M.M., having ships to employ, a freight to Newfoundland looked just as good to it as freight to any other place. For the past two years then, or longer, the direct line of steamers from Halifax to St. John's, Newfoundland has been a sufferer from the roads made by its traffic by the com-

Man Who Fought the Germs.

WONDERFUL LIFE-WORK OF A GREAT SCIENTIST.

The son of a humble tanner who became one of mankind's greatest benefactors—such was Louis Pasteur, the French scientist, whose genius led to the discovery and cure of many diseases which, before his day, had baffled science.

Born nearly a hundred years ago, he lived the beginning of his life in comparative poverty. It was by reason of his indomitable will that his genius bore fruit.

He was quite an ordinary student at school, but when he embarked upon his serious studies he started on a line of discovery that was to end in fame. At that time there was general belief in "spontaneous generation"—that is, that germs can come to life without antecedents similar to themselves. Pasteur took up the study and showed that all germs have germ parents, and that the germs in dust, in particular, played a large part in bringing to life the organisms that cause disease.

Thrills On the High Seas.

STIRRING STORY OF BRITAIN'S DECOY SHIPS.

It is only recently that the full and dramatic story of the work of the mysterious "Q" boats against the German submarines has been made public.

One of the earliest successes of the "Q" ships—ships, as a rule, were either old trampers or small sailing ships armed with hidden guns—was that achieved by the collier S.S. Prince Charles, commanded by Lieut. Mark Wardlaw, R.N.

On July 24th, 1915, the vessel sighted a U-boat about three miles off. The collier had hoisted her colours, and soon a German shell came whizzing across. It fell about 1,000 yards short.

Lieutenant Wardlaw, in order to simulate the movements of an ordinary merchant ship in the presence of an attacking submarine, stopped the engines and ordered the crew to get the boats out. The gun-crew, of course, was left behind in the ship.

The enemy was approaching rapidly, and fired a second shot, which passed between the funnel and the foremast, but landed fifty yards away. When the range was only 600 yards, the enemy turned her broadside on the collier.

Lieutenant Wardlaw, seeing that the enemy could not be enticed any nearer, opened fire with his port gun. The effect on the German vessel was remarkable and instantaneous; for her gun's crew immediately darted down into the conning-tower. While they were doing so one of the Prince Charles's shells struck the submarine.

Still the British fire continued, and when the submarine's bows were a long way out of the water she took a sudden plunge and disappeared.

Another vessel, the S.S. Baralong, a typical tramp-steamer fitted up as a "Q" ship, had been cruising about for six months without encountering the enemy. Then one day, about one hundred miles south of Queenstown, she came upon a submarine shelling a Leyland liner.

The Baralong struck the American colours she was showing, hoisted the White Ensign, and trained her guns ready for the moment when the submarine should show herself ahead of the liner's bows. In a few seconds the submarine came along. The range was only 600 yards, and the Baralong opened fire, penetrating the U-boat on the water-line before she could reply.

The conning-tower went up in the air, panic-stricken Germans jumped into the sea, and in a moment the submarine went down.

The Exact Situation.

LETTER FROM MR. J. T. MEANEY.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir—In this evening's issue under heading "Offering Employment," you publish the following news item:—

"Efforts are being made to induce the unemployed around Conception Bay to go to the lumber woods for the summer and fall, but so far the idea has not taken on. A meeting was called at Holyrood yesterday, and at 4 p.m. Magistrate O'Toole, Messrs. George Kennedy and J. T. Meaney addressed a gathering advising the men to go to the lumber camps where \$2.00 per cord was being offered for cutting pit props."

Your reporter's informant did not get a correct report of the matter. May I trespass on your space to give the facts as the question of employment at present for labouring men is one of public interest. The Aerial Survey Co., under the management of Major Cotton and his associates have entered upon lumbering operations at Hawke's Bay, Northwest Coast, and have advertised for men to go there to cut pit props for export to Great Britain.

They offer \$2.00 per cord piled where cut, or \$4.00 per cord piled at the shore of Hawke's Bay. The company will arrange transportation for any men needing it from their nearest railway station to destination, the amount advanced to be deducted from their earnings, but not all at one time. The men will obtain supplies from the company's store at Hawke's Bay as they require such. These are the conditions as stated to me by Major Cotton for the information of men desirous of availing of the opportunity they offer.

My visit to Mr. Main on Sunday was for the purpose of making these conditions known to the people there, and to remove an erroneous impression that was abroad regarding the Hawke's Bay labor giving enterprise. I spoke to the men of Conception H. Avondale, Mr. Main, and Holyrood giving them the particulars as stated above. Neither Magistrate O'Toole nor George Kennedy spoke at either of these gatherings. That the men are now convinced that they can earn good wages at Hawke's Bay is evidenced by the fact that to-day I have received the names of thirty men who are prepared to proceed there as soon as transportation can be arranged, and I have reason to believe there will be at least one hundred more applying before the end of this month.
