Work May Soon be Resumed in Nova Scotia Coal Mines

Martial Law Proclaimed in British S.W. Africa—Compromise Suggested in the Matter of French Vatican Representative—Scotland Wins Football Championship.

N. S. COAL MINES MAY SHORTLY RE-OPEN.

HALIFAX, N.S., April 5.

Despite the absence of official confirmation the belief persists tonight that the re-opening of the Nova Scotia coal mines, closed four weeks ago, when Besco refused to meet the demands of its 12,000 miners for restoration of credit at the Company's stores and the operation of three idle mines on a minimum basis of four days per week, is only a matter of days. Among the factors believed to be operating in the direction of immediate settlement, is the responsibilities assumed by the Government in caring for the destitute with closing appeals for public charity. It is generally admitted that \$20,000 already voted by the Government will last little more than a week and although the Premier stated an additional amount would be forthcoming if needed, it is believed strong measures are being taken to shut off the need for relief at the earliest possible moment. Practically the only hindrance at present to an immediate re-opening of the collieries, in well-informed circles, is the announced refusal of the Company to pay the 1924 rates under any circumstances; but since the Corporation has previously agreed to pay these rates under an interim contact pending investigation, it is not believed this obstruction is insuperable.

MAY COMPROMISE ON VATICAN APPOINTMENT.

PARIS, April 4.

It was announced to-day at the Foreign Office that the entrance of Senator De Monzie into the cabinet as Finance Minister, does not mean that the French Ambassador will be retained at the Vatican. A high authority declared that M. De Monzie's views on that subject will be heard and considered on the same footing as those of other members of the Government, but that a compromise solution would more likely be adopted, something between the maintenance of an Ambassador and the appointment of a simple Commissioner for Alsace.

MEAGRE RETURNS FROM ULSTER ELECTIONS.

BELFAST, April 4.

Only meagre returns are available so far from the elections to the Ulster Parliament yesterday, but early results show Joseph Devlin had achieved a great personal victory in his West Belfast constituency. In East Belfast, James Gyle, Independent Unionist, who is an inn-keeper, is believed to top the pole. His campaign was in opposition to the Government's drink policy. Following the custom of allowing children whose names accidentally get on the election lists to vote, Robert Allison, aged 3, cast his ballot at Derry, and Ethel Bowman, aged 7, voted at Carrick Fergus. Four centenarians voted at North Tyrone.

MARTIAL LAW PROCLAIMED.

CAPE TOWN, Union of South Africa, April 4.—It was reported here to-day that martial law had been proclaimed in the territory of the Bechoeth tribe, in the mandated territory of South West Africa, in which disorders among the natives have recently assumed a serious aspect.

MILLERAND BACK IN SENATE.

PARIS, April 5.

Former Premier Millerand to-day was elected senator for the Department of Seine to succeed Senator Magny. M. Millerand received 530 votes and M. Autrand, his chief opponent, 175.

CHAPMAN TO HANG.

HARTFORD, Conn., April 4.

Gerald Chapman, spectacular mail bandit, jail breaker, and criminal extraordinary, to-day was sentenced to hang in the Connecticut State Prison, on June 25th, in payment for the life of a New Britain patrol man, of whose murder, last October, a jury had convicted him less than an hour before. Frederick J. Groehl, Chapman's chief counsel, immediately filed notice with Judge Jennings that he will appeal.

the conviction. Charles Murphy, also of defence counsel, had previously made a motion that the jury's verdict be set aside, but it was denied. "Chapman, I'm sorry," Groehl said to the prisoner after the jury had been dismissed and Chapman had been returned to the courthouse basement to await further developments. The Attorney, with tears in his eyes, reached out for the condemned man's hand. Without a break of voice or wavering of his cold blue eyes, Chapman squeezed his lawyer's hand and replied, "Oh, that's all right."

BOLSHIES TO SWAMP WORLD WITH BOGUS MONEY.

TORONTO, April 5.

It would be impossible for the Bolshevists to swamp the world with bogus money, said Sir John Aird, President of the Canadian Bankers' Association, in commenting on a London cable that such a plan had been organized. "Vulgar threats came out of Russia six months ago that a scheme of the sort would be attempted. That put all the banks on the qui vive and I cannot see the slightest danger of any such plot succeeding. With regard to the forgery imposed on the Imperial Bank of Canada, Sir John expressed the view that it had been nipped in the bud and investigators now had the situation well in hand.

TRANS-CANADIAN AIR FLIGHT CONTEMPLATED.

MONTREAL, April 5.

The first direct trans-Canadian air flight will be attempted in the early autumn when the Laurentide airplane, Viking, will leave Vancouver in the early morning and endeavour to reach Montreal about noon the following day, according to present tentative arrangements. With this spectacular flight the Viking will conclude the summer's gold prospecting expedition in which the ship will enable foreign capitalists to try their luck in the districts of Northern British Columbia which, without the air machine, could not be visited unless the prospector was prepared to remain there during the winter. The Air Board, in 1921, organized a trans-Canadian flight, but seven machines were used to cover the distance, and the feat took two weeks to accomplish.

WILL ASK GOVERNMENT TO ACT.

WINNIPEG, April 5.

Efforts will be made to enlist the support of the Manitoba Legislature on behalf of the residents of Cape Breton suffering as a result of the coal strike. John Queens, Labor leader, will ask the Legislature, Tuesday, to make representations to the Federal Government, urging immediate relief be granted to meet the needs of the starving people in the affected districts. The Legislature will be asked to urge the Federal Government to establish a Commission of Enquiry, which would place the blame where it
