Device by Germans to Avert Disaster

Electrical Apparatus to Treat Helium May Revolutionize Dirigible Navigation.

BERLIN, Nov. 19.—The United Press learned to-day that two youthful chemists of Berlin University have invented a device foreshadowing the electro-helium airship and capable of revolutionizing dirigible airship navigation.

The inventors claim that the Shenandoah disaster would have been avoided with this invention.

Dr. Hugo Eckener, head of the Zeppelin works and pilot of the American Zeppelin ZR-III (now Los Angeles), predicted that it would convert dirigible navigation into a "creative business."

The invention consists of an electrical apparatus which warms and thus expands the gas when required, and cools it subsequently rather than allowing it to discharge, wasted into the air in an emergency, or when a descent is desired.

Hitherto "valving" of helium has been expensive, particularly as the gas is rare and costly.

In the old days Zeppelins were put out into the sun to warm the gas before starting a journey. The new invention is in effect an artificial sun and refrigerator combined.

The inventors are Dr. Kurt Peters and Peter Schlumbohm, chemists of the big university here. Each is 28 years old.

Dr. Luther on Locarno

GERMANY TO WORK FOR DISARMAMENT.

The German Chancellor, Dr. Luther, speaking to the Union of German Merchants and Industrialists, said:

The Treaty of Locarno does not constitute a choice between East and West. Such a choice would in Germany's geographical, economic, and political, economic, and political position have been not merely a crime but folly.

Our choice signifies our firm determination to work with all our power for general disarmament, which, in harmony with the Treaty of Versailles, is regarded as the undisputed complement of German disarmament.

President von Hindenburg, speaking at Stuttgart to-day, declared that Germany's greatest need was unity and the subordination of the interests of political parties to those of the whole country.

It is hoped that these words will have a profound effect on the verdict of the nation and its representatives with regard to the Locarno treaties.
