

The Reform Meeting in Elora.

We have heard many speeches delivered by Hon. Geo. Brown, but we never heard one more eloquent or more convincing than that which he delivered in Elora, at the splendid gathering of Reformers there on Friday night.

ELECTION NEWS.

The writs for the election in the County of Halton have been issued. The nomination will take place in Milton, on Thursday next, and the polling will come off on the following Thursday.

Spittoon Ferguson is not to have all the honours himself. John Carling purloined the private documents of a railway company to serve him in his extremity, and the Kingstons Bruiser discloses private correspondence for a like purpose.

The Berlin Telegraph says there is no opponent to Mr. Bowman in the field as yet, although it is rumored that he will be opposed by Mr. Walter, of Bamberg. We are well aware that the Tories have been making their best efforts to get a candidate in the field to oppose Mr. Bowman, and it may be possible they have so far worked upon the weak points of Mr. Walter's character as to induce him to become a candidate on the day of nomination.

Requisitions are in circulation throughout London in favor of different candidates for the position of representative in the Ontario Legislature.

Shanly's friends in Centre Toronto acknowledge that Wilkes is certain of election, and claim that it is owing to the fact that Shanly is absent from Toronto.

Prof. McLennan had a most successful meeting in West Toronto on Thursday night. The meeting was large, and a resolution promising support was carried unanimously.

The Sarnia Observer says there is still no word of the arrival of the writ for holding the election for that County, the object of the Government evidently being to keep it back to the very last, so as to prevent Mr. Mackenzie from getting another seat in the event of his defeat.

The Globe says:—The Ministerial journals are industriously spreading a report that Mr. Carruthers spent large sums of money at the last election in Kingston. It is entirely untrue; Mr. Carruthers positively refused to spend a single penny in anything which resembled bribery.

The nomination for the Eastern Division of the city of Toronto took place on Friday, at the listings erected in front of the City Hall, Mr. Jas. Carruthers Returning Officer. There was a very large attendance of the electors present.

The nomination for East Gray took place on Friday. Several candidates were proposed, but all retired except Mr. Flesher and Mr. McKnight.

The nomination of candidates for North Bruce was held on Friday, when Mr. A. Sprout, of Walkerton, was nominated by Mr. Monkman, of Arran, and seconded by Mr. Beardman, of Elderslie; and Mr. J. Gillies, of Paisley, was nominated by Mr. Porteous, of Paisley, and seconded by Mr. Kilbourn, of Ivernay.

The Hon. A. Mackenzie arrived at Picton by steamer from Belleville on Friday morning, and addressed a large number of the electors at that place. The steamer "Hate Dem" arrived from Kingston about three o'clock with a large party, among whom were Mr. John Carruthers, Mr. B. M. Britton, and other prominent politicians from Kingston.

Everything progresses to the entire satisfaction of the Reform candidates in Hamilton, whose majority now reaches, according to the canvass returns, upwards of 500; and from past experience there is every reason to believe that this number will be about the actual majority.

The Carleton Election.

The Ottawa Free Press, which was Mr. Rochester's organ all through the Carleton election, and which, consequently, should be fully acquainted with his position, speaks of the result as follows: "Political organs, generally credited with speaking the opinions of the Government, endeavored to damage Mr. Rochester in the estimation of those who desired to support the Government, by asserting that he was either an opponent of the Government or the tool of those who were. The effort has been instrumental in adding to Mr. Rochester's majority. The people have shown that they are not to be dictated to by any party; nor are their natural principles to be guided into any particular channel in order to please the whims of any individual.
