First Presbyterian Church held a very en-
joyable social in the school room of that
church last evening. The children partook
of a supper early in the evening, and after-
ward presented for the entertainment of
their parents and friends a programme
which was very creditable.—Messrs. W. J. Reid, Ed. Paull, Thos.
Beattie, J. Priddis and P. W. D. Broderick
have been elected directors of the Masonic
Temple Company. A proposal was made
to allow representatives of the lodges to
take the places of the directors on condi-
tion that the bodies holding stock in the
company assumed the responsibility and
control of the stock of their hands. It was
thought that the different lodges might
raise from \$1,500 to \$2,000 and secure the
controlling power at present held by the
directors for them, but no action has yet

Water Consumers, Beware!

The meeting of the water commissioners
held last night was attended by Chairman
Wm. Jones, R. K. Cowan, Engineer
Moore, Secretary Ellwood, Inspectors
Plasow and Platt. Commissioner Cowan
suggested that an advertisement be placed
in the daily papers warning consumers
to repair all leaks at once. The inspector
will start on a house-to-house inspec-
tion on May 1, and every service where
a leak is found will be shut off
at sight. Those who are found sprinkling
their lawns without paying for a lawn ser-
vice will be summoned. This will be
carried out without respect to person.
Hobbs Hardware Company paid a quarter's
rate for their gas meter service
under protest. The inspector said that
the register was broken. Unless it is re-
paired at once the service will be cut off.
The protest was laid over. Henry Brins-
mead complained at last meeting that he
was charged an excessive rate. The in-
spector reported that the meter was in
order, and the charge was correct. A dis-
cussion on the advisability of placing meters
in city manufactories was laid over in
order that the engineer could further re-
port. The usual accounts were passed.
The Land of the Pyramids.At St. James' Presbyterian Church last
evening Dr. Mungo Fraser gave a graphic
and entertaining description of a trip with
one of Cook's tourist parties in the spring
of 1891. As an introductory he stated that
the cost of such an excursion is about
\$1,200 and the length of time taken three
months. The lecturer took his audience in
their imagination from New York city
right through the European continent,
giving some very amusing incidents on the
way to Alexandria. One of the first points
that struck him was the price paid
for female labor. Little girls of 12
years and upwards and old women
would work all day long as hodcarriers at
15 cents a day. Women were also hitched
along with dummies, ponies, oxen or any
animal that would work to do plowing and
other drudgery. He briefly described the
Egyptians' manner of irrigation, wood-
sawing, wedding and funeral ceremonies
and their musical instruments. His journey
up, down and through the interior of the
pyramids was very interesting. The
howling dervishers came in for a good
description, and the lecturer greatly
amused the audience by showing the man-
ner in which these fanatics worshipped.
Rev. M. P. Talling closed the lecture about
10 o'clock with the benediction.

A JUVENILE DOCKET

Before the Police Magistrate—Lepidney
Shown—Troublesome Youngsters.The police magistrate had a juvenile
docket this morning. Of his six subjects,
five were small boys. Of these three wept
copiously and the other two were indiffer-
ent—they had been there before. Charles
and Alvin Prosser, aged 14 and 11, of Ade-
side street, were up for sentence, having
pleaded guilty to stealing brass hubs from
George T. Hiscor. Mr. Love made a
plea for leniency. Both boys, he said, were
apt pupils at school and the elder, if re-
leased, would be taken immediately to his
grandfather in Springfield and put to work
on the farm.The magistrate demurred somewhat, as
the boys had twice or thrice been released
after similar crimes. He decided, however,
to season justice with mercy again, and, on
condition that Albert be shipped off imme-
diately, suspended sentence. Their home
influence, he heard, was not the best.
The father was a hard working man, but he
had doubts about the mother.James Halliday, Herbert Sutherland and
James (ushman, lads ranging from 16 to 14
years of age, sobbed out that they were
guilty of stealing 300 pounds of lead
(value \$11) from the G. T. R. repair shops
on Ridout street. It was the first time
they had been there, and they seemed to
feel the disgrace almost as keenly as the widowed mother of
one of them present. Halliday, said the
chief, was to be pitied. He had a wretched
home and was brought up on the street.
The other two had always been good boys
and their employers were willing to take
them back. Mr. McKillop agreed with the
magistrate that the interests of justice
would be best served by giving them
another chance, and as Constable Logan put
in a kind word for them they were dis-
missed.
