Big Crowds at the Fair.
WORLD'S FAIR GROWDES, June 23.—
The feature of the World's Fair to-day was the weather and the crowd. The visitors marched through the gates of the "White City" like an invading army. The steady increase in the attendance of visitors at the fair is so rapid and marked that the bureau of admissions is confident the daily average will soon reach the 200,000 mark.
