HAS NOT RECED

Britain Has Lost Her Monopoly, But There Is No Retrogression, Says Carnegie.

London, May 30.—6 a.m.—Mr. Andrew Carnegie has an article in The Nineteenth Century on the industrial outlook in Great Britain. The article is written with discrimination and is favorably commented upon. What is gone from England, says Mr. Carnegie, is her monopoly. There has been no

retrogression. Altogether the article is a neat rebuke to many pessimists who have written on the same subject. Lord Rosebery knows nothing of the rumor, started in the United States, that he is to succeed the late Baron Herschell on the joint high commis-

sion.

BRITISH LOSSES
In South Africa During May Were 42 Killed and 101 Wounded—Col. Lessard Honored.

London, May 29.—Casualty lists issued by the war office give 42 British killed and 101 wounded. The majority of these casualties occurred from May 22 to May 25, and between Bethel and Standerton, in the Eastern Transvaal, where General Blood has been operating.

The Official Gazette announces that the title taken by Sir Alfred Milner on his elevation to the peerage is Baron Milner of St. James, in the county of London, and of Cape Town, in the colony of the Cape of Good Hope.

ENERGY WASTED.
Cape Town, May 29.—Thomas Burrows, an Australian, has just completed a test of endurance in club-swinging. He continued his task for thirty-six consecutive hours, beating by six hours the previous world's record of thirty hours, made by himself.

COL. LESSARD, C. B.
London, May 30.—Lieut.-Col. F. Lessard, C. M. G., Royal Canadian Dragoons, has been appointed a Companion of the Bath (Military Division). Col. Lessard, who was born in the city of Quebec, Dec. 1, 1859, has been in command of a troop, Royal Canadian Dragoons, since August, 1894, and since May, 1896, he has held the additional appointment of inspector of

cavalry. He receives the C. B. from the King in acknowledgment of his services in South Africa, and he is believed to be the first French-Canadian to be admitted to the military division of this most exclusive order, since the appointment thereto of the immortal De Salaberry, the hero of Chateaugay. Lieut.-Col. Lessard was created a C. M. G. in the first batch of military honors.

BOERS AT WORK.
London, May 30.—A despatch from Kroonstad says the Boers derailed an armored train on which General Williams was traveling. The front truck was blown up with dynamite, and the Boers fired a volley into the cars. A British relief column, with a Maxim gun arrived, and the Boers dispersed. ENGAGEMENTS NOT BEFORE RE-PORTED.

The list of casualties in South Africa refers to a number of engagements hitherto unreported. There was fighting on May 22, 23, 24 and 25, between Standerton and Bethel, the British losing an officer and five men killed and twenty-four men wounded. Other fights on a small scale are reported, but they extend over a wide area in the Transvaal and Orange River colony.

USELESS REQUEST.
A despatch to the Standard from Brascia says that Mr. Kruger has formally petitioned the international arbitration court to intervene to settle the South African question. The court will shortly be convened, but will certainly proclaim that it is incompetent to deal with the matter.

BOERS MASSING.
Queenstown, Cape Colony, Wednesday, May 29.—The Boers are massing under Commander Kritzinger to the northward of Bailey. There is much local apprehension, and the town guard remains all night in the trenches. Passenger traffic to the north is suspended, and freight is proceeding under an armed escort. The banks close at noon.

FROM CHINA TO INDIA!
Transports Waiting to Remove British Troops.

International Situation Improved—French Forces Likely To Be Soon Withdrawn—The Indemnity Question.

Tien Tsin, May 29.—Two British transports have arrived at Tongku to take troops direct to India. Another transport will arrive today to take the Beluchi Regiment to Wei Hai Wei.

General Lorne Campbell, British commander here, says the international situation at Tien Tsin is better than at any time since the arrival of the troops. On the departure of the Americans the Russians objected to the British hoisting their flag on a bridge when the American flag was taken down, but General Wogack, the Russian commander, withdrew his objections.

FRENCH LIKELY TO LEAVE SOON.
General Voyron, the French commander, expects now that the evacuation has been decided upon, that France will command the order holding her troops temporarily in China. He anticipates the early arrival of French transports.

Berlin, May 29.—All the powers have accepted Germany's proposal to withdraw Field Marshal Count von Waldersee from China and surrender the chief command. The United States expressed satisfaction at the extremely tactful and skillful manner in which von Waldersee discharged his most difficult duties, and at his great courtesy towards American officers.

Germany's contingent, remaining in Pe Chi Li will be somewhat over 4,000 men.

WILL FOOT THE BILL.
Berlin, May 30.—The German minister at Peking, Dr. Munn von Schwarzenstein, confirms the report that an edict was issued by the Chinese emperor Monday, May 27, agreeing to pay the indemnity of \$50,000,000 taels, with interest on the principal at four per cent.

MAY HAVE TO PAY \$1,000,000 A DAY.
Washington, May 29.—The department of state has been informed that the Chinese Government has agreed to pay an indemnity of \$1,000,000 a day.

ONLY A NAME ON THE MAP.
HAVANA, May 29.—President Capote visited Governor-General Wood this morning to talk over the proposed election law, which will be the next work of the convention. The general intimated that the United States would ask that some changes be made in the constitution. El Mundo says: "By the vote of yesterday Cuba's independence and nationality were made subjects of the United States. In future we shall be only a name on the map of the world."

CABLE NOTES.
Gen. Weyler, minister of war, at a banquet in Leon, Spain, said it is proposed to establish three army corps capable of repelling any invasion without recourse to extraordinary expedients. There will be maneuvers of the troops twice each year.

News has been received from Persia that the proposed new Russian loan of 15,000,000 to 20,000,000 roubles has fallen through because the shah was unwilling to give the required security and grant the privileges secured in South Persia. British influence is blamed for the failure of the loan.

The Vienna Neuss Weimar Tagblatt, in the course of an article advocating the formation of a European customs league against the United States, says: "America is the common enemy of all—an enemy so formidable that each of the forty republics must succumb unless leagued with the rest of Europe. Even united Europe will have a hard fight."

Terse Telegrams.
Mrs. S. Ennis, of Lacolle, Que., took poison Tuesday evening, and died from the effects.

F. C. Whitney, of Minneapolis, and a brother of J. P. Whitney, is seriously ill in Ottawa.

Senator Fairbanks, of Indiana, has been formally announced as a Republican candidate for president for 1904.

Steps have been taken to organize an ex-Northwest Mounted Police Association in the Northwest Territories.

Herman Kuhe, who shot his wife and then himself, Jersey City, Tuesday night, died early Wednesday morning. Mrs. Kuhe will recover.

A Turkish consul has been appointed to Montreal to look after the interests of the Turks, Assyrians and Armenians in Canada.

According to the latest census 72,000 persons inhabit the eight assembly districts of New York City, which comprises less than one hundred acres.

The unhealthyness of Liverpool is marked and persistent, despite the great natural advantage it has in a tidal river and fresh air from the sea.

E. Bale, cashier, of the New York Life Insurance Company, was run over at New York by an express wagon and severely injured that he died in hospital.

It has been determined to form a company for the purpose of working the oil wells recently discovered at Belmont, near Lausanne, in Switzerland.

At Worcester, Mass., St. John's Catholic Church was broken into Tuesday night, the safe blown open, and vessel to the value of more than \$1,000 taken.

Tuesday night Detroit detectives pressed a stolen automobile into service, and succeeded in arresting four young fellows stealing brass mountings off a Wabash railroad car.

The municipal buildings of Paris are overrun with rats and mice, and the prefect of the Seine has had 5,000 francs put at his disposal in order to deal with the nuisance.

A carter named Venney, while unloading freight at the G. T. R. sheds, Brockville, was knocked down by a rolling barrel of salt and had his head jammed. He was taken to the hospital.

The governors of the New York Stock Exchange on Wednesday listed the \$100,000,000 first lien convertible 4 per cent gold coupon bonds of the Union Pacific Railway Company.

The Molsons Bank at Montreal has followed the example of the Bank of Montreal and the Canadian Bank of Commerce by presenting eighteen of its clerks with memberships in the Montreal Amateur Athletic Association.

CZAR TO PRESIDENT MCKINLEY.

Sends a Message of Good Will and Congratulation.

Suspected Plague Case Found Near London—Little Wood Wanted in British War Ships.

St. Petersburg, May 30.—Frederic W. Halls, of the international court of arbitration, left for Warsaw tonight after having been received in special audience by Emperor Nicholas in Peterhof Palace at noon today. The emperor thanked Mr. Halls for his history of the peace conference, dedicated to his majesty, and expressed the deepest gratification over the cordial support from the American people and the United States Government.

His majesty charged Mr. Halls with a personal message of goodwill to Mr. McKinley and congratulations on the recovery of Mrs. McKinley.

PLAGUE CASE NEAR LONDON.
London, May 30.—At Willesden, an outlying suburb of London, a man supposed to be suffering from the lightest form of bubonic plague, has been discovered. Persons with whom he had come in contact were detained, but have now been released. The patient himself is still under observation.

WOOD IN WARSHIPS.
The admiralty have issued an order that in the future the least possible amount of wood is to be employed in the construction of warships. Such vessels now building, where they are not too far advanced, will have their woodwork and other wooden fittings taken out.

CONCESSIONS FROM SULTAN.
The Daily Mail says that Dr. Theodore Herzl, founder of the Zionist movement, and the Palestine Association, have recently had several audiences with the Sultan of Turkey, who has decorated Dr. Herzl and presented him with valuable gifts. Dr. Herzl has been formally announced as a Republican candidate for president for 1904.

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
