432 MILES AN HOUR

New Motor Train That Is Expected to Break All Records.

New York, May 12.—A mile and three-tenths in fifteen seconds is the speed promised by Professor Albert C. Albertson, president of the Electro-Magnetic Railway Construction Company. By July 1 he expects to have in operation in Staten Island a railroad equipped with his new magnetic motor. He has figured it all out with a model. According to Professor Albertson's time schedule this train will travel at a rate of about 432 miles an hour, which is approximately five times as fast as the swiftest express in the United States. He says he himself does not yet know the exact maximum of speed that his invention can attain to, but is convinced that it can haul a train along a straight track at more than 400 miles an hour. The rails of the Staten Island road rest on a steel framework eight feet above the ground. The object of this is to give the train what the inventor calls "absolute immunity from wreck." The wheels are to be run on rails, and then to make sure that they cannot jump the track magnets will be run along under the rails. No matter how big is the rate of speed reached, Professor Albertson says, this mode of construction will effectively prevent the train from leaving the track. The principle of the invention is so simple that even a layman may readily understand it," said the inventor. "I have spent seven years to its study and perfection."

JAPS CONTROL ALL BUT PORT ARTHUR

Russians Concede Enemy Is Paramount On Peninsula.

GEN. KUROKI STARTS FLANKING

Kuropatkin Expected to Strike When Nikado's Divisions Become Separated.

St. Petersburg, Thursday, May 12, 2:35 a.m. — Impending events of great importance to the military situation in Manchuria are foreshadowed in official dispatches given out late last night by the war commission. On May 8 the Japanese forces cautiously moved from Feng Weng Cheng towards Hai Cheng, which is thirty-two miles east by rail from Newchwang, and it is the opinion of the general staff they should certainly reach their destination within two days. If the Japanese should occupy Hai Cheng, and with Port Arthur thus effectively cut off, Newchwang, which the Russians have already dismantled, would pass into their hands. The entire Liao Tung Peninsula, in fact, save Port Arthur and perhaps Kai Ping, would be commanded by them. The consoling fact at the establishment of communication with Port Arthur is increased by the knowledge that a trainload of ammunition has been safely delivered to the fortress. This was done in the presence of the enemy's army which landed at Pitswe, and which is apparently not holding of being reinforced by another division on board thirty transports lying off Port Adams.

The troops sent by Gen. Kuroki to the southwest of Feng Weng Cheng, where it is established does not belong to a third army, now having landed at Taku. Shant crossed the Taying River, May 7, and should by this time be operating in the Liao Tung Peninsula. Besides acting energetically in Southern Manchuria, and moving on Hai Cheng, General Kuropatkin has kept in mind the necessity of outflanking General Kuropatkin at Liao Yang. It is shown in fact that on the morning of May 10 he started a formidable force, consisting of infantry, artillery, 4 guns and 1,500 cavalry, toward Salmatai (Salmatai). In view of General Kuropatkin's statement that an examination of the ground showed that between Salmatai and Feng Weng Cheng failed to show the presence of Japanese, the authorities are puzzled as to where the Japanese detachment is reported officially to have occupied Kwan Tien Shin, May 8, but it is believed that it is a small scouting party belonging to General Kuropatkin's army.

The authorities are looking with considerable apprehension at the division by General Kuropatkin of his army into three separate commands, for they expect Gen. Kuropatkin promptly to take advantage of the numerical inferiority of the enemy.

The fact that it is considered necessary to send a trainload of ammunition to Port Arthur has aroused comment, and it is expected in certain quarters as an indication that the Russians have a sufficient supply of war material there.

A member of the general staff says: "There are ample supplies of munitions of war at Port Arthur, but naturally General Kuropatkin desired to send as much as possible to the front. Many articles in his pockets were found intact. At the conclusion of today's inquiry it was decided that nothing further could be gained by the search of the body. Proposition of Lake Carriers' Association Rejected by the Men.

Cleveland, O., May 12.—A vote was taken last night by the different harbors along the great lakes on the proposition submitted to the masters and pilots for this year's terms of employment. Nineteen out of twenty-six harbors whose reports have been received shows an overwhelming vote in favor of rejecting the proposition of the vesselmen, the vote in most instances being unanimous. "The result of the vote indicates a struggle between two great lake interests which may involve the several other classes of labor ashore and on water. It was strongly felt that the Lake Carriers' Association has offered to pay last year's wages. This is not satisfactory to the masters and pilots, who claim that some boats have paid their captains as much as from \$200 to \$300 more than others of similar class. The masters and pilots want a uniform scale. President Livingston, of the Lake Carriers' Association, has made the statement that if the proposition of the vesselmen is not accepted by the masters and pilots the association will go ahead and try to work the boats without the union men."

WENTZ MURDER MYSTERY

Two Men Held and Charged With Killing Millionaire's Son

Knoxville, Tenn., May 12.—Warrants were served yesterday on Silas Isom and Tom Wright, prisoners in jail at the prison here, charging them with the murder of E. L. Wentz, whose body was found near Big Stone Gap last Sunday. The two men were being held in jail on the charge of being fugitives from justice. They were first suspected of being the murderers of Wentz because a riding suit, similar to one worn by Wentz, was found in their quarters in the mountains. This suit had blood stains on it. Wentz, it is believed, was shot by the two men running a "blind tiger" in Wise County, Va.

Bristol, Pa., May 11.—The shrunken and charred body of Edward L. Wentz was literally torn to pieces today by physicians and detectives in the course of the coroner's inquest. At 7:30 the jury adjourned until 9:30 o'clock tomorrow morning, when many witnesses will be heard. The startling feature of the inquest today was the discovery of a 32-caliber bullet in the body, which might have been discharged from a pistol found eighteen feet from the body. The bullet had penetrated the heart and lodged in the muscles of the back. The right hand was missing, a white mitten, however, which could not have belonged to the murdered man, was found near. Two cartridges were in the pistol, but the coroner's inquest today was held in an empty shell. A loaded cartridge of 32-caliber was found seven feet from the body. Many articles in his pockets were found intact. At the conclusion of today's inquest it was decided that nothing further could be gained by the search of the body. WINTER HURT WHEAT

Fail Product of the Province Thought To Be In Bad Shape.

Toronto, May 12.—The Deputy Minister of Agriculture said yesterday that the annual report on the crop prospects of the province, as prepared by the department, and as reported in all parts of the Province after May 15. The circulars which were to be sent to the correspondents were destroyed in the big fire, and considerable time was occupied in reworking them. The Deputy Minister of the Interior, in supporting the bill, read a number of manifestoes issued by the Polish revolutionary party, amid the mocking laughter of the Polish members. The minister declared it to be a fact that the nucleus of the Polish army was being organized in Chicago in anticipation of an insurrection. "You may laugh," he declared, addressing the Poles, "but you know it is true. Officers and men are training in Chicago to serve in a future revolt."

By observing that such organizations, though fantastical, are none the less dangerous. It therefore behooved the Government to take resolute measures for the promotion of the well-being of the German population of the Polish provinces.

Clara Morris On Old Age.

New York, May 12.—Clara Morris has made a great discovery. She announced at the actors' home in West Brighton, S. I., that old age is a blessing to a woman, and that a woman ought to look forward to it as the supreme happiness of life. "I didn't know I was old," she said, "until I came down to New York this time, and now I'm having the time of my life. Everybody gives me a sheltered corner to sit in. I won't be in a draft, young men love me, and the freshest stories, young women tell me their love troubles—and make me thank heaven they're not mine. Old age suits me all right." Exercises were held in commemoration of the second anniversary of the crops.

NEW RAILWAY COMMITTEE

Messrs. Latchford, Harcourt and Dryden Are Appointed.

Toronto, May 12.—The Ontario Government has appointed Messrs. F. R. Latchford (chairman), R. Harcourt and John Dryden, as the railway committee of the executive council. The first meeting of the committee will be held on May 13, at the town of Etobicoke without the consent of the municipality, and for power to deviate from the highway to their own private property. W. B. Wilkinson, assistant law clerk of the assembly, will be secretary of the committee. The committee has jurisdiction over all railways, electric railways and street railways, subject to the Legislature, and may exercise the powers conferred on the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council and the commissioner of public works by the railway act of Ontario or any special act respecting railways. It is authorized to supersede agreements between railways for running rights, crossings, etc., and to settle disputes between railway companies and municipalities, with respect to services, rates and speed and cars.

SATOLLI TO VISIT U.S.

Use of Female Singers in Church Choirs May Be Discussed.

Rome, May 11.—The Tribune commenting on Cardinal Satolli's proposed visit to the United States says: "The Pope is sending Cardinal Satolli to the United States for a thorough inquiry into Catholicism here, the Vatican fearing a revival of Americanism."

"Nine archbishops of the United States have informed the Vatican that it is impossible to apply to America the rules laid down by the Pope with regard to the Gregorian chant, as the suppression of female singers in church choirs would make merely to accept invitations of his many friends there to visit the United States."
