**WILL TAKE IN
FAIR ON MONDAY**

**Holiday Ordered for the School
Children—Change in
a District.**

Monday, Sept. 11, will be a holiday
for the school children of the
little ones will on that day be able
to see the Western Fair and get the
advantage of the special rate of
admission without "mitching" from
school.

This is what the board of education
decided yesterday afternoon after re-
ceiving a letter from the fair board
requesting that Monday be made a
holiday. Dr. Teasdale moved, and Mr.
MacRobert seconded, that the request
be granted. There was no opposition
to the motion. Thus the ridiculous
state of affairs which has existed for
years, with the special rates on one
day and the holiday on another, will
be at an end. The fair board found
the trustees easier this year, and anyone
who looks might find the reason.

Inspector C. B. Edwards recom-
mended the board to make the first day
of the Rectory street school dis-
trict from the south side of Dundas
street to the north side, in order to
take away some pupils from Lorne
avenue, which is overcrowded.

The board adopted the suggestion,
on motion of Trustee Fitzgibbon, but
not before Trustee Blackwell had re-
gistered a kick. The latter said that
the board would not take children
away from the school, and that they
had grown up without more consid-
eration being given to the matter. But
the others did not see it in this light.
Both principals, Mr. Edwards ex-
plained, had agreed that the change in
the boundary would just about even
matters up in regard to school at-
tendance.

Mr. G. B. Kirk wrote to the board
thanking the trustees for their kind-
ness during his recent illness and stat-
ing that he was now able to resume his
duties.

Col. Gantshore wrote, asking that a
committee representing the residents
of Chelsea Green be allowed to confer
with a committee of the board, to see
whether some arrangements could not
be made whereby the children who
lived on the Green could be allowed to
attend the city schools. The matter
was referred to No. 1 committee.

Mr. George Tanton and Miss Sarah
Brown were placed on the substitute list.

Miss C. G. McIntosh, teacher of do-
mestic science in the high school, was
granted leave of absence until June 29
next, in order that she may attend the
college at Guelph. A substitute is be-
ing arranged for in the meantime.

Principal Radcliffe reported a big at-
tendance at the first day of school. He
said that the work done by the pupils
in the late examination had been re-
markably good, there being 140 certifi-
cates won in all.

Inspector Edwards said that the at-
tendance at the public schools yester-
day had been away from the average
usual for the first day of school. He
thought that the announcement that
the firm of the board and of No. 1
committee, together with himself, were
to visit the schools during the day had
had a salutary effect. The visiting
committee had heard that the break-

SOUTH LONDON AT WAR OVER STREET RAILWAY LINE

Two Petitions Presented to the
Council, and Each Backed
Up by a Deputation.

The people of South London were
well represented at the council meet-
ing in the city hall last night. The
reason for this was the fact that the
proposed new street car line in South
London was to be considered, and as
the people themselves are not agreed
on the matter, they were present in
two sections, each prepared to back up
its own petition.

In the end the council simply re-
ferred the matter to a special com-
mittee, who will meet next week and try
to straighten out the tangle.
The two petitions were read by City
Clerk Baker. The first was for a line
running from the present belt line rail-
way at the corner of the Wharncliffe
road and Askin street, southerly along
the Wharncliffe road, to Elmwood
avenue, thence southerly along Elmwood
avenue to Edward street, thence south-
erly on Edward street to Briscoe street;
thence easterly along Briscoe to the
Wortley road, thence southerly along
the Wortley road to Garfield avenue,
thence easterly along Garfield avenue to
Ridout street, thence northerly along
Ridout to the present belt line at the
corner of Elmwood avenue and Ridout
street.

The second petition took its cue from
the first, but suggested: "That the line
continue south, instead of north on
Ridout street to Emery street, east on
Emery to High, north on High to the
Wellington street stub line."
Ald. Cooper at once declared the
matter too important to settle off hand,
and that the council was going to
the city that wants a street railway.
He moved that the petitions be sent to
No. 1 committee. Ald. Greenlees se-
conded, but an objection was raised. Stevely,
the deputation, were heard.

One Side of the Argument.
Mr. J. B. McKillop, represented the
people of South London, who desire the
line constructed according to the first
petition. He said that this line which
the London Railway Company has
agreed to build, would be of infinite
more value to the people of the
suburb as a whole than the Wortley
road line, which the company is bound
to build under the agreement of last
year, unless the prayer of the petition
is granted. The company is not bound
to build any other line, and Mr. Carr
has agreed to construct the line advocated
by the petitioners he represented, he

Deputation Waits On Council
and Lays Bare Many
Grievances.

True to their declarations of some
days ago, the people of West London,
represented by Messrs. F. A. Jones and
W. T. Hamilton, waited on the city
council last night and laid their griev-
ances re the breakwater delay before
the civic fathers. They were well
treated by the aldermen, who declared
once again they had the causes of the
many delays explained to them. They
were also assured that all that it is
possible for the city to do will be
done at once with the breakwater. Mr.
Hamilton, however, somewhat aston-
ished the council by asserting that it
was too late this year to do anything,
and by suggesting that the best the
city can do is to prepare to begin
next year.

Mr. Jones Speaks.
Mr. F. A. Jones, who from the first

not go much on the statement that
work was to commence on the break-
water because of the fact that
tenders for the Douglas avenue sec-
tion have been let. He denied that

represented in the council. He said
