Special Power Committee Considered Offer of the London Electric Company.

#### ALDERMEN IN DARK, HOWEVER

And Ask Engineer Sifton to Report on Several Important Matters Regarding the Propositions.

The four propositions of the London Electric Company relative to the sale of their plant and the distribution of Niagara power were discussed at the meeting of the special power committee yesterday afternoon, but as none of the members were in a position to discuss the offers, they were laid over until Engineer Sifton prepared a report on

the matter. His instructions were to report on the cost of bringing Niagara power here in 1,000, 2,000, 3,000 and 4,000 horsepower lots on the basis of \$23 50 per horsepower for 5,000-horsepower. The committee desires to-know just what the power will cost, provided they cannot sell the larger quantity, but must take the smaller amount, namely

#### 3.000-horsepower.

Cost of Distribution. Mr. Sifton must also figure on the cost of distribution within the city of 1,000, 2,000, 3,000, 4,000 and 5,000 horsepower, with a plant covering the same amount of territory as the London Electric Company's. This may or may not be accomplished by the \$235,-000 plant provided for by the bylaw. The committee were not certain as to
