Rosebery had renounced home rule, and was followed by Asquith, Grey and others, who had remained loyal to Gladstone. This breach in the Liberal ranks was widened by the Boer war, Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman renained a convinced Home Ruler, and was an unsparing critic of the South African policy of the Unionist Gov-

ernment, which was defended by the so-called Liberal Imperialists. 
