TALKED SEPTIC TANKS BUT DID NOTHING

Mayor Stevely Has Returned From the Conference Held in Toronto.

Mayor Stevely returned last evening from Toronto where he was attending a conference of the delegates from several municipalities regarding the drain of the City of Septic Tank Company, of Chicago, re royalties on all septic tanks in use in Canada.

The meeting was adjourned until next week, when further information will be given the delegates on the subject.

There were about twenty delegates, said Mayor Stevely. "Four or five municipalities interested were not represented, including Berlin, where the matter was first broached. The Cameron Company were represented by Mr. Wythe, of Chicago, and by Mr. Stowe, a lawyer of Buffalo. A stated case of considerable length was presented by the company, copies of which will be sent to the municipalities. The company, of course, claimed that they had the patent right on the idea, and asked for a royalty. The amount was determined upon the amount of money invested in the plant, the saving in the cost of the disposal of the sewage.

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It was difficult to figure out just how much we were supposed to pay over in royalties.

A Problem.
"That seemed to be an engineering problem of some magnitude. We listened to the proposals of the company, but took no action.

A deputation was appointed to interview the provincial health authorities as to the latest and best ways of the disposal of this sewage; and a report will be presented at the meeting.

"The disposition among the delegates was that either a newer and better way should be adopted, or the case fought in the courts.

"Mr. Willis Chapman was of the opinion that the claim of the company was not good and should be disputed.

"We will meet next week some day, and talk the matter over again. It is probable that the municipalities will fight the case in the courts.

OPERATOR BLAMED.
New York, June 15.--Responsibility for the death of 19-year-old Salina Schoonmaker, of Saugerties, N. Y., who was killed in an elevator in the Flat Iron Building on June 7, was placed by a coroner's jury today on the operator of the car, Stephen Young.

Young was placed under \$5,000 bail for his appearance before the grand jury on a charge of homicide. William D. Brinnier, former mayor of Kingston, appeared as counsel at the inquest as did Nelson Schoonmaker, father of Miss Schoonmaker, who was called to the stand to identify his daughter's body.

YOU LITTLE HOUND? CRIED MRS. GOULD

Remarks That Were Not in Keeping With \$500 Gowns.

COULDN'T WALK STEADY

Employees at Castle Gould Testify to Intoxication of Their Mistress.

New York, June 15. -- Torn with anger and extreme humiliation, alternately flushing with shame, sobbing or clenching her hands in exasperation, Katherine Clemmons Gould sat through a trying ordeal in the supreme court today at the continuation of her suit for separation against Howard Gould, third son of the late Jay Gould.

It was a day of testimony for the defence, during which Gould's attorney sought to bring out through witnesses who had been associated with Mrs. Gould that her habits were such that her husband was justified in leaving her. In the event of proving this the defence hopes to undermine the charge of abandonment, the only phase of the plaintiff's case which has withstood the attacks of opposing counsel. Howard Gould himself may take the stand tomorrow.

Mrs. Gould having naively told what is required of women of fashion in the matter of dress in Palm Beach and elsewhere, witnesses for the defence recited today the indulgence of the same of fashion in the matter of alcoholic stimulants and told further, while the heavily-veiled woman buried her burning face in her hands, that Mrs. Gould had consumed \$500 worth of certain remarks and conversations not exactly in keeping with \$500 worth of the palatial Castle Gould on Long Island.

COACHES HER LAWYER.
It was during this testimony, some of it as related too strong to be printed with propriety, that Mrs. Gould wept most. Yet she recovered herself quickly and at times coached her lawyer, refreshing his mind on certain incidents with suggestions and reminders.

Specific statements that Mrs. Gould had been intoxicated on various occasions, that she called Howard Gould "you little hound" one night; that once she was apparently so under the influence of liquor as to stagger against the banister at Castle Gould; that her maid brought liquor to her room, including sometimes two cocktails before breakfast, were among the statements brought out as employees of the Gould estate related their former mistresses.

In the midst of the testimony
