Militia Order No. 78, issued a few weeks ago, modifies to a slight extent the rules of last year, which tent the rules of last year, which

The new order amends the regulations in force last camp which necessitated the rifleman getting no less than 14 points at each of the two ranges for 20 cents additional pay; 21 points at each, for 50 cents. The result of this was that the man who scored an aggregate of 30 points, but who made it up with 18 at one range and 12 at the other, was not entitled to any efficiency pay because he had not scored 14 or more at each. This was the cause of much dissatisfaction among the men, and it was to remedy this that the recent order was issued.
