Lords Oppose Tampering With Hereditary Rights

London, March 17 .- When the House of Lords adjourned last night, the discussion on the Rosebery resolutions looking to the reform of the chamber, had not been concluded, but it was expected that they would be referred to committee today, without division. The speeches generally showed a strong feeling against any tampering with the hereditary principle. Lord Curzon of Kedleston, the chief speaker, supported Lord Rosebery, and favored a scheme partly elective and partly nominative, but opposed the destroying of the hereditary principle, and had no sympathy for a purely elective chamber.

Lord Cromer also supported Lord Rosebery, but showed

himself only a lukewarm reformer. The Earl of Halsbury spoke

strongly for the retention of the existing constitution of the Parliament will rise for the Easter recess March 23.
