

MADERO VISITS BURIED CELLS

Inspects Prison Beneath Harbor
of Vera Cruz

NO RAY OF SUNSHINE CHANGE IN COMPLEXION

New Mexican Government to Do Away
With Death Trap.

Vera Cruz, Mexico, Oct. 26.—Three Americans—Leslie E. Hurlbert, alias Richardson; William Mitchell, alias Mason, and Dr. Charles S. Harlan—are subterranean prisoners of San Juan de Ulua, may yet see the light of day and be released from the terrible ordeal which they have passed through in the last four years for killing two companions.

"I did not believe that such a terrible condition existed in Mexico or any other civilized country," was the remark President-elect Francisco I. Madero made recently as he emerged from the dark and dingy chamber beneath the waters of the gulf in the harbor of Vera Cruz, where hundreds of suffering men are confined to a veritable living tomb.

Madero, upon his arrival in Vera Cruz from a trip through Tuxtepec and Campeche, asked the local authorities to take him out to the prison that he might obtain a personal knowledge of the conditions that exist there. He confessed after his return from the terrible experience that he had anticipated seeing horrors, as the San Juan de Ulua has for more than a century been notorious for its toll of human life. Madero was stunned by the atrocities that he saw practiced upon the helpless victims in this prison.

"It is unbelievable," he declared, "that human beings can be made to go through such sufferings."

He said that one of the first acts of his administration will be to practically obliterate this death trap and torture of human souls.

President Madero, on his visit to the prison, paid special attention to the cases of Hurlbert, Mitchell and Harlan, and it is considered probable that one of his early acts will be to pardon these men. The crimes which they were charged with were committed ten years ago. They were found guilty of slaying Harry Mitchell, and a brother-in-law of Harlan, and William Deviers, an outcast whom the conspirators run across in El Paso. These two men were killed in Chihuahua, Mexico, for \$50,000 life insurance they carried, the insurance on the victims having been taken out by the man who killed them.

They spent two years in prison in Chihuahua before they were tried, and on trial they were convicted and sentenced to be shot. This penalty was about to be carried out, the death watch being set upon the men, when the governor of Chihuahua, who was at that time Enrique Creel, commuted the sentence to 20 years' imprisonment. Under the Mexican law the first six years of this imprisonment must be in solitary confinement. Shortly after the commutation of their sentences they were brought to Vera Cruz, where they were confined to the cells, where they usually end in death.

REBEL LEADER IS POPULAR

Head of Portuguese Monarchist
Plot Liked By Soldiers.

CHANGE IN COMPLEXION

Paris, Oct. 26.—Captain Henrique de Paiva Conceicao, the principal leader of the monarchist revolt in Northern Portugal, is very popular in the Portuguese army, especially among the artillery in which branch he served. During the days of the 4th and 5th October, 1910, he fought heroically in the streets of Lisbon and was among the last defenders of the palace of the Necessidades against the Republicans.

When the monarchist regime was definitely ended Conceicao was not molested by the Republicans. The new war minister, Colonel Barreto, even offered him a higher grade, which at first he accepted, but soon gave up to work for the cause of the King.

One day before a group of soldiers, the captain had a lively altercation with Colonel Barreto.

"Who are you for?" questioned Conceicao abruptly, turning to the men.

"For the king or the republic?"

"No, for you, captain," they answered without hesitation.

Paris Complexions.

A Phone Feat.

The French state telephone engineers have succeeded in connecting Paris and Madrid, and the service will be soon opened to the public. The establishment of oral communication over such a distance—800 miles—is only one of a number of reforms which are being instituted, the central battery among them, at first condemned by many great telephone authorities, but now regarded as essential by everybody. The switchboard at the principal exchange is being remodelled on the American plan, and the automatic exchange, now under trial at Lyons, shall be adopted for the whole system. The automatic exchange, which does away with the "telephone girl," who is much slower and less courteous in France than in America.

SPARKS NEAR POWDER

A French Battleship Narrowly Escapes
Destruction.

Toulon, France, Oct. 26.—An alarming outbreak of fire occurred today on board the French battleship Justice, a sister ship of the Liberté, which was taken up on Sept. 25. The fire is believed to have been due to a short circuit. A shower of sparks fell in dangerous proximity to the magazines and the commander of the battleship immediately ordered the forward magazines flooded. The fire was got under control and no great damage resulted.

An hour later the battleship Diderot signalled that she had fire aboard caused by the short circuiting of a dynamo. Workmen who were aboard made for the boats, though the crew remained at their posts and rapidly extinguished the fire.

He said that every section of the Liberal party was united on the selection of Mr. McIntosh, and he predicted a notable victory.

BOSTON'S MYSTERY

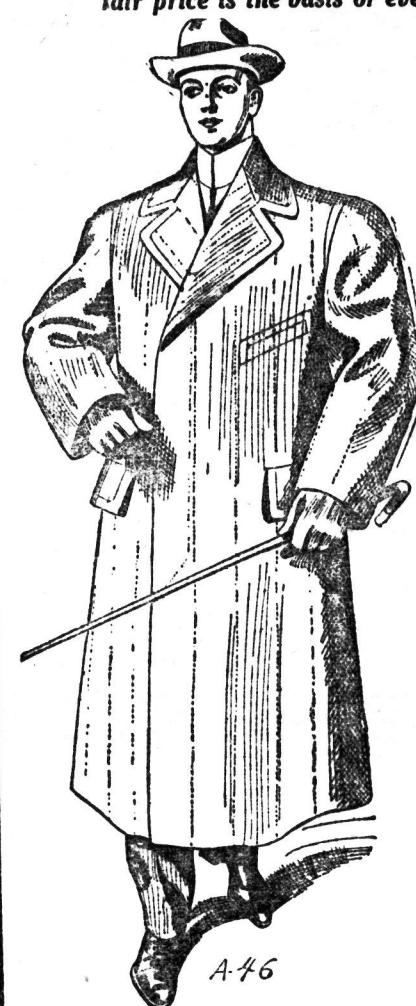
