Pollution of Waters To Be Discussed by International Body at Washington.

[Canadian Press.] Washington, Nov. 18.—The international oint commission, which deals with boundary and other questions in dispute between Canada and the United States met ere today and probably will be in session or a week or more. Probably the most for a week or more. Probably the most important question taken up will be that concerning the pollution of the waters dividing the two countries. These include more than 2,000 miles along the St. Lawrence River and the Great Lakes, and the problem affects a number of large cities. The proposal to construct a dam for the protection of the Livingstone Channel in the Detroit River also will be discussed.

### DOMINION EXAMINATION FOR MEDICAL MEN

All Provinces Have Now Passed a Law Approving a Dominion Council.

[Canadian Press.]
Toronto, Nov. 18. — Dr. Bray, registrar at the Ontario College of Physical Processing April 2011 cians and Surgeons, has received notification from Dr. T. C. Roddick, Ottawa, that no examinations will be held under the authority of the Dominion Medical Council until after the meeting of that body in June next. The examination under the Dominion council will give the successful candidate the right to practice in any province in the Dominion, but before becoming eligible to take that examination he must hold a license to practice in the province of which he is a resident. The law creating the Dominion council was passed by the Federal Government, but required the various provincial governments to pass a law approving of it. All the provinces have now passed the enabling law, Ontario approving of it at the last session of the Legislature.
