

FATE OF GUNMEN NOW IN BALANCE

Jury Will Have Case in Hands Today—Civilization at Stake, Says State Attorney.

New York, Nov. 18.—The last word for and against the four gunmen on trial for the murder of the gambler, Herman Rosenthal, was said today when counsel made their appeals to the jury for conviction and acquittal. Tomorrow their fate will be delivered into the hands of the jury, probably in the afternoon, and it is expected that Justice Goff will take up all of the morning session in charging the jurors as to the law and the evidence.

The four defendants, "Gyp" the Blood, "Lefty Louie," "Dago Frank," and "Whitney" Lewis, heard themselves characterized by District Attorney Moss as "the hands which hold the instruments of death—the hands of the body of which Rose, Webber and Vallon were the brains, and Lieut. Charles Becker the will." He referred to them as "that battery of gunmen," and declared that the witnesses who identified them showed "the courage of soldiers marching to the cannon's mouth."

"It may require some courage for a jury to rise up and bring in a verdict of murder against these men," he continued, "but this is a rare time for the performance of a great public duty to the commonwealth."

Challenge Civilization. "This is the crime of crimes—a challenge to civilization, a blow in the face of American law and order. I call upon you for a verdict that will vindicate the law and order and make these gunmen and their friends realize that there is a God in New York and a jury that is not afraid of bullets."

By their attorney, Charles C. A. Wahle, the defendants were pictured as men who had been criminal, but who were innocent of this crime—the victims of the testimony of the men who really killed Rosenthal, Rose, Webber, Vallon and Schupp. "Give me these boys and I will make men of them," said Mr. Wahle. "Gyp the Blood" and "Lefty Louie" listened to the foreword of the two lawyers with stolid faces. Their fellow defendants, "Whitney" Lewis and "Dago Frank" were visibly affected.

GUNS USED TO CHECK STRIKE SYMPATHIZERS

Mob Was Interfering With the Miners at Mouth of Porcupine Pit.

South Porcupine, Nov. 18.—Guards at the Hollinger mine today were forced to draw their guns on a mob of strike sympathizers who were interfering with a workman, who was attempting to enter the property. Demonstrations occurred at the mine, and in addition damage to the extent of \$5,000 was done to the plant of the newspaper. The building is owned by the Government, and was to have been torn down next month. The loss is covered by insurance.

AGED WINDSOR DEAD.

Windsor, Nov. 18.—Thomas Volfans, 83, one of the best known of the older businessmen in the city, is dead at his home here. Mr. Volfans had been ill for some months. His wife died last June. CHIEF JUSTICE SHOCKED AT MAGISTRATE'S WAY

Judgment Reserved in the Case Over Macdonald Bye-Election at Winnipeg.

Winnipeg, Man., Nov. 18.—Judgment was reserved by the Manitoba court today after hearing argument on the motion to lay criminal information against Magistrate McMillen for his action in disposing of personation cases arising out of the Macdonald bye-election.

Mr. C. P. Fullerton, K. C., who appeared for McMillen, submitted an affidavit from the magistrate in which he freely admits that the cases were disposed of in his private office prior to the opening of his regular court, but that he had had no previous knowledge of the cases, and would have wished to be present, especially in view of the fact that the accused were ready to plead guilty. The magistrate also admits that he lost his temper when lawyers court, but explains that this was due to their asking him irritating questions.

Mr. Fullerton argued that it was a common practice for magistrates to dispose of cases privately where accused were pleading guilty. Members of the bench, evidence of this practice, and Chief Justice Howell declared that any such practice prevailed in the Winnipeg courts. Mr. Fullerton then attempted to argue that there was no evidence of corrupt motive on the part of the magistrate, but was reminded that this was a matter for deduction from the evidence.

The point that the fines imposed by the magistrate were illegal without an accompanying prison sentence, as provided for in the elections act, was not pressed by Mr. W. H. Thompson, who appeared in support of the application. The magistrate's counsel argued, with apparent success, that there is a general provision in the criminal code, which gives a police magistrate power to really impose the penalties of the act in certain cases.

OTTAWA NEWSPAPER GUTTED BY A FIRE

Heavy Damage Done to Offices and Plant of Le Temps.

Ottawa, Nov. 18.—The building occupied by Le Temps, the French newspaper published here, on St. James street, was completely gutted by fire tonight, and in addition damage to the extent of \$5,000 was done to the plant of the newspaper. The building is owned by the Government, and was to have been torn down next month. The loss is covered by insurance.

FAILED TO REPORT SMALLPOX CASES

Quebec Health Authorities To Prosecute Many Medical Men.

[Canadian Press.] Montreal, Nov. 18.—After quietly working with a view to securing evidence against certain persons in connection with the recent outbreaks of smallpox in various parts of the province, the officials of the provincial board of health now state that they are ready to report cases of disease coming under their notice. Difficulty has been met with by the provincial authorities in securing information which would form a basis of suit against a medical bureau cases of the disease have arisen and which were left unreported by the attending physician. The board is at present in the hands of the "befriended" whom they were visited by illness.

SIR GEORGE MURRAY HURT

British Expert Breaks Arm Leaving Ottawa Parliament Buildings.

Ottawa, Nov. 18.—Sir George Murray, the British expert, who came to Canada at the request of the Government to suggest certain necessary reforms in the civil service, is in the General Hospital suffering from a severe fracture of the right arm. Sir George slipped and fell while leaving the main entrance of the Parliament Buildings this afternoon, falling on his arm and side. The fracture was reduced tonight by Dr. E. B. Echlin. Sir George is 63 years of age.

NEW C. P. R. STOCK ISSUE

Announcement Follows Plan Fore-casted at Shareholders' Meeting.

Montreal, Nov. 18.—Definite announcement is made tonight that the C.P.R. will make the issue of \$50,000,000 common stock, authorized at the special meeting of the shareholders last month, early in the coming year. The new stock to the full amount authorized by the meeting will be offered to shareholders of record at 2 on Thursday, Jan. 2, next, the right to subscribe to expire on Thursday, Feb. 13. The issue is to be made, as forecasted, at \$175 a share.

WATERWAYS COMMISSION

Pollution of Waters To Be Discussed by International Body at Washington.

[Canadian Press.] Washington, Nov. 18.—The International Joint Commission, which deals with boundary and other questions in dispute between Canada and the United States met here today and probably will be in session for a week or more. Probably the most important question taken up will be that concerning the pollution of the waters of the Great Lakes. These lakes include more than 2,000 miles along the St. Lawrence River and the Great Lakes, and the problem affects a number of cities. The proposal to construct a dam for the protection of the Kingsport area in the Detroit River also will be discussed.

The Canadian members who reached here today are Thomas Chase Casgrain, of New Brunswick, and Charles A. Magrath, of Ottawa.

FATHER FORGET DEAD. Cobalt, Nov. 18.—Father J. O. Forget, parish priest, of Cobalt, died at St. Charles, Que., last night. Father Forget got left Cobalt last week for a hospital near Montreal. He was 38 years old, and had been parish priest here for four years.

DOMINION EXAMINATION FOR MEDICAL MEN

All Provinces Have Now Passed a Law Approving a Dominion Council.

[Canadian Press.] Toronto, Nov. 18.—Dr. Bray, registrar at the Ontario College of Physicians and Surgeons, has received notification from Dr. T. C. Roddick, Ottawa, that no examinations will be held under the authority of the Dominion Medical Council until after the meeting of that body in June next. The examination under the Dominion Council will give the successful candidate the right to practice in any province in the Dominion, but that examination he must hold a license to practice in the province of which he is a resident. The law creating the Dominion Council was passed by the Federal Government, but requires the various provincial governments to pass a law approving of it. All the provinces have now passed the enabling law, Ontario approving it at the last session of the Legislature.

Fort William, Nov. 18.—Willie Noakes, aged 10 years, son of William Noakes, a local painter, was instantly killed at Franklin School this morning by the explosion of a dynamite cap which he had been chewing. The youngster's face was practically blown to pieces. The accident happened in the presence of a teacher and fifty pupils, who were just about to disperse for the noon meal.

DEATH OF JOHN A. M'KEE

Prominent Toronto Financier Dies Suddenly of Hemorrhage.

Toronto, Nov. 18.—Mr. John Arnold McKee, a well-known figure in Toronto to financial circles, died suddenly last night at his home, 53 Walmer road, as the result of a bursting of a blood vessel and the consequent internal hemorrhage.

The late Mr. McKee had enjoyed excellent health until yesterday morning, when a slight indisposition caused him to remain at home instead of leaving as usual for his office. During the day his condition became worse, until the evening, when the bursting of the bloodvessel caused death at 11 p.m.

The late Mr. McKee was born at Rosemount, Simcoe County, in 1859, and at about 23 years of age became a commercial traveller for the firm of Milburn & Co., proprietary medicine manufacturers. In 1885 he founded the Dods Medicine Company of Canada, and later similar concerns in the United States and Great Britain. He was the president and owner of the
