AN UN-CANADIAN AND UN-BRIT-
ISH POLICY.

The Borden Government's naval policy is a \$35,000,000 subterfuge. It is based on no rational or national principle. It is repugnant to genuine Canadian sentiment, to the whole trend of Canadian development, and to British ideas of freedom. It gives no effective aid to the mother country, upon whom it throws the burden of maintaining three unnecessary ships of the costliest type.

The First Lord of the Admiralty said no later than July that if the Imperial Parliament granted his demands, the British naval program would provide an ample margin of security. Parliament gave him all he asked for. We quote from his speech in the House of Commons on July 24:

"We are really masters of the situation. There is no cause for panic or alarm. It will be our own fault if, at different fixed periods, we are not capable of maintaining the margin necessary to our security. If the House accepts our recommendations and gives us the large subsidies we demand, we believe we shall have the necessary margin of security in 1914, and that in 1915 our situation will be as favorable as in 1914. In 1916 the proportion of our vessels will slightly increase. There is no possible development that can affect the situation in 1914, and as to any development that may arise in 1915 or 1916 we shall be able to face it when we know what it is."

No doubt Mr. Churchill and the other members of the British Government will profess to welcome the Canadian Government's gift—it would be impolitic not to make a show of gratitude; but Mr. Churchill cannot, unless he confesses that he deceived the Imperial Parliament five months ago, pretend that three new Dreadnoughts are anything but superfluous at the present time. Nothing has happened in the interval to call for an increase in the program laid down. The German "menace" is not more real or imminent. The British Prime Minister says the relations between Great Britain and Germany are "excellent." The German Chancellor, only three days ago, declared that the two nations were working together in the Balkan situation with "mutual trust" and "most gratifying intimacy." As a matter of fact, the very memorandum of the admiralty read by Mr. Borden destroys the legend of an emergency or a crisis. The admiralty declares that "WITHOUT COURTING DANGER AT HOME, GREAT BRITAIN IS STILL ABLE TO SEND AN EFFECTIVE FLEET OF BATTLESHIPS AND CRUISERS TO THE PROTECTION OF THE DOMINIONS."

Supporters of the Canadian Government who reply that the new Dreadnoughts will be available for a Canadian navy, merely emphasize the insincere, illogical, makeshift nature of the arrangement. The creation of a Canadian navy would fall within the Government's definition of a "permanent policy," which it is pledged to submit to the people, if it contemplates such a policy it is evading its pledge by spending \$35,000,000 for this object without asking the country's consent. In order to avoid an appeal to the people it throws honor to the winds—or the waves. It trumps up an "emergency" on the other side of the Atlantic as a pretext for its cowardly refusal to do its duty at home. The Prime Minister who now sends Dreadnoughts, built with Canadian money, to the North Sea, is the man who three years ago at a Dominion Day dinner in old London uttered these words:

"Some feeling was created in the British Isles owing to the fact that Canada did not, by resolution or by speech from the Prime Minister, vouchsafe the offer of one, two or three Dreadnoughts. The resolution, in the form in which it was passed, while its terms might not upon the surface seem as significant at the moment as the offer of one or two Dreadnoughts would have been, laid down a permanent policy for the Dominion of Canada which would serve a more practical purpose than any such offer of Dreadnoughts."

Mr. Borden cannot reconcile that statement with his position today. The contrast between his utterance in 1909 and his action today is the measure of his perjury in the interval. He boxed the compass and trimmed his sails to the gale of Nationalism, which swept over Quebec. Now he has driven on the shoals and rocks.

Take another illustration of Mr. Borden's utter abandonment of the position he took under his short-lived impulse of patriotism in 1909. Today he says:

"Is there really any need that we should undertake the hazardous and costly experiment of building up a naval organization, especially restricted to Canada, when upon just and self-respecting terms we can take such part as we desire in naval defence through the existing naval organizations of the Empire, and in that way we can fully and effectively avail ourselves of the men and resources at the command of Canada?"

And on Oct. 14, 1909, speaking at

Halifax, on his return from Great Britain, he said:

"One governing principle at least should control, namely, that out of our own materials, by our own labor, and by the instructed skill of our own people, any necessary provision for our naval defence should be made so far as may be reasonably possible. In this connection may we not hope that there shall be given a stimulus and encouragement to the shipbuilding industry of Canada which has long been lacking?"

For this self-respecting policy, based upon Canadian interests, political and economic, he substitutes the doctrine of vassalage and tribute. It is a throw-back to the days when Canada was in the trammels of administration from Downing Street. Nor is any true service rendered the mother country or the Empire. Influential British journals are already complaining that Canada has thrown a new and unnecessary weight on the shoulders of the British taxpayers. The building up of a new centre of strength in the British Empire, which was the aim of the Laurier policy, has been abandoned or indefinitely retarded.

MOVEMENT BEGUN TO
ADVERTISE COUNTY

A Joint Meeting Held on Thursday Night—Committee Named.
