Selling There at Double What It Is at Present Worth in America.

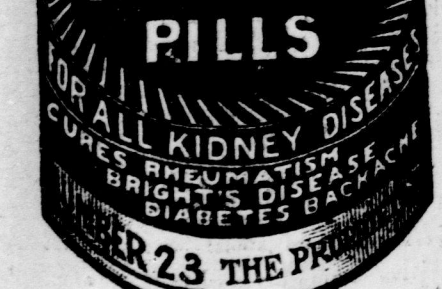

RUSSIA CAPTURES ANOTHER VILLAGE

Has Placed New Army on the Offensive in the Mlava Region.

BAYONETS CHASE ENEMY

Przemysl Garrison Force Annihilated in Recent Sortie.

[Canadian Press.] PETROGRAD, Jan. 6.—The official statement from the Russian staff in Poland shows that the Russians have placed another army on the offensive in Mlava region, and have captured the village of Rosowka, driving the enemy out at the point of the bayonet, and that in Galicia the Czar's forces have occupied Sybot and Kameral, Gurahumora and Boukoshia, the latter two places on the direct route to Transylvania. The official statement follows: "Our troops on January 5 made a sudden attack against the village of Rosowka, to the west of the road from Przemysl to Mlava, near Groduck. The enemy, who occupied this village, were entirely bayoneted. We also took some prisoners.

"On the left bank of the Vistula the usual cannonading and rifle fire are continuing. Fighting of secondary importance is proceeding in the region of Borjow, and near Mogheli farm.

"In Galicia the situation is unchanged. "Our offensive is proceeding in Bukowina, where we have occupied Sybot and Kameral, south of Salsin and Ilichestie, on the roads to Gurahumora and Plekatchik. On January 4, after an engagement we occupied Gurahumora and Boukoshia. The latter two places are situated on the best and most direct route to Transylvania by way of Bukowina."

Austrian Force Annihilated. The Novoe Vremya says that a recent sortie by the Austrian garrison, which is defending Przemysl, the date of which is not given, resulted in the complete annihilation of the Austrian force.

The sortie was preceded by extensive cavalry reconnaissance. Then Austrian infantry advanced in force in the direction of a wood near the city. The Russians opened fire, but the Austrians rushed forward and gained the cover of the woods. They continued to push forward, and the Russians permitted them to advance close to their positions before making a serious effort to halt them. With the fighting thus at close range, the Russians opened up a terrific fire from rifles and machine guns.

It is said that not one of the force which made the sortie regained the fortress. Those who were not killed or wounded were captured. The temperature at Przemysl is close to zero.

RUSSIANS REINFORCED IN THE CARPATHIANS

Austrian Official Statement Says Situation Remains the Same.

[Canadian Press.] VIENNA, Jan. 6.—Via Amsterdam and London, Jan. 6.—3:35 a.m.—The following official communication was issued here today:

"The battles in the Carpathian forest districts, which now have lasted for several months with alternate successes, continue. These are battles of minor importance, and have taken place in lonely valleys.

"The enemy has received the last few days received reinforcements and attempted to gain ground by attacks in isolated spots on the upper courses of the rivers.

"West of the Uzsok Pass and in East Beskid the situation is quiet.

"On the fronts north and south of the Vistula artillery duels continue."

LONDON PAIR ARRESTED FOR BEING VAGRANTS

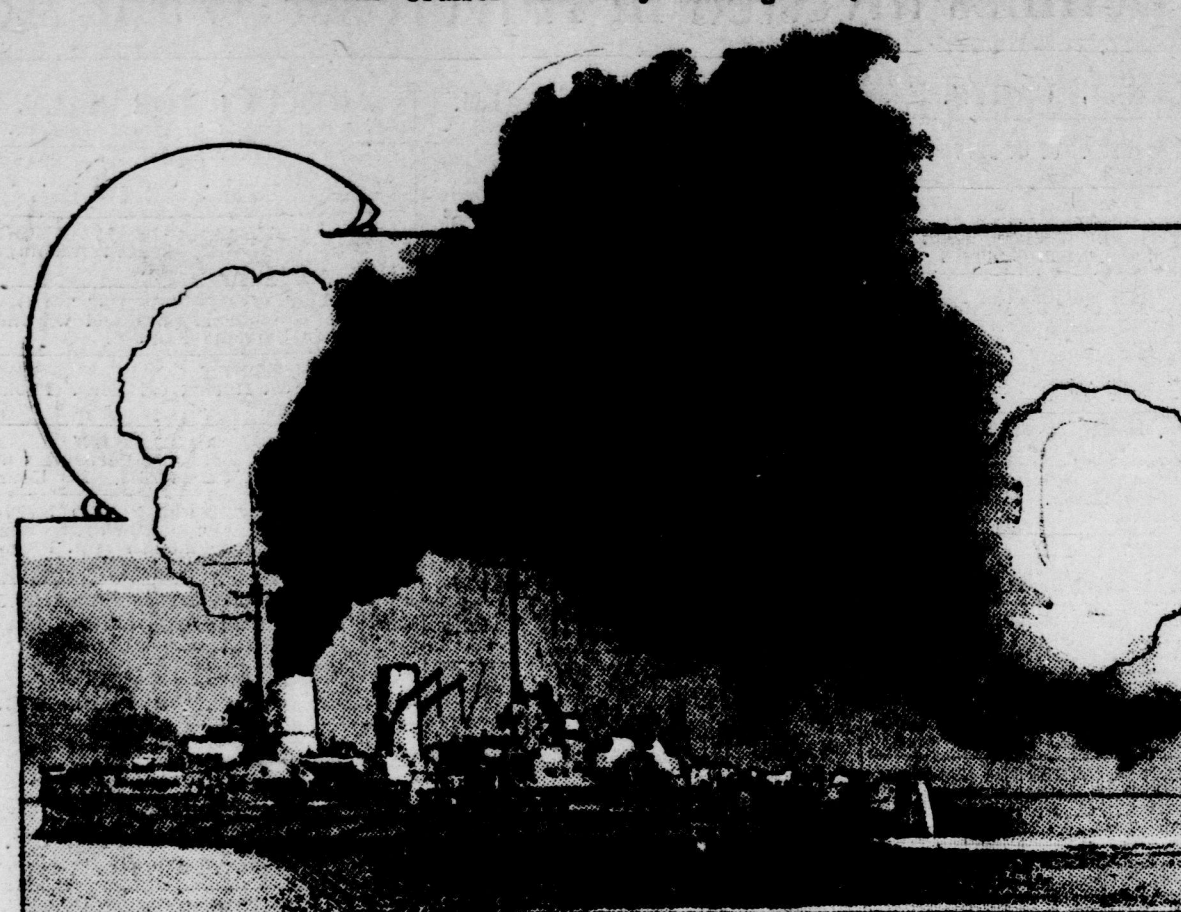
[Special to The Advertiser.] STRATFORD, Jan. 6.—The police broke up the affairs of a couple from London last night when they created a riot in the streets.

Goeben Is Again in the Repair Shop.

Powerful Turkish Cruiser Seriously Damaged by Russian Mines.



COPENHAGEN (Via London), Jan. 6.—9:15 p.m.—A special dispatch to the National Tidende from Constantinople says the former German cruiser Goeben, which now flies the Turkish flag, struck two Russian mines in the neighborhood of the Bosphorus and was seriously damaged. She has two big holes on her water-line, and it will take two or three months to repair her.

This fact, the dispatch adds, has been kept secret from the people of Constantinople.

NEWS OF DEFEAT WILL START A REVOLUTION IN TURKEY

PARIS, Jan. 6.—A high Turkish official stated here tonight that as soon as the defeat of the Turks in the Caucasus becomes known in Constantinople there will be a revolution that will quickly end the usefulness of the Turkish armies to the German cause. A large part of the Turkish people were opposed to the war and the failure of those dominating the Young Turk party to make good their aggressive attitude coupled with the opposition shown to German leadership of both the army and the navy, is likely to arouse a storm that will tear the empire asunder.

The Turkish people have not been informed of the true progress of events. When the awakening comes it will be a sad day in Constantinople.

AUSTRIA READY TO YIELD TERRITORY TO SERBIAN FOE

Correspondent Learns That Northern Albania and Coast Frontier Goes With Peace Offer.

[Canadian Press.] LONDON, Jan. 6.—The Morning Post publishes the following dispatch from its Rome correspondent:

"I hear that Austria has offered peace to Serbia on the basis of the status quo plus northern Albania, including Durazzo and the coast to the Montenegrin frontier. A complete reversal is made of what Count Berchtold announced on October 30, 1912, described as essential to Austrian policy."

RUSSIAN VICTORIES COMPLETELY SPOILED PLANS OF THE TURKS

[Canadian Press.] PETROGRAD, Jan. 6.—The following statement of the general staff of the army in the Caucasus was issued tonight:

"At the end of November the bulk of the third Turkish army was sent to the region east of Erzerum, preceded by two army corps, besides a reserve corps near Hassan Kalass.

"In conformity with the plan of Enver Pasha, the third army was to proceed as follows: The ninth and tenth army corps were to advance in the direction of Otl, and form the offensive wedge, whereas the eleventh corps had orders to hold its powerful organized position, and to attract, through a strategic demonstration, the weight of our troops, the eleventh corps had been ordered to fall back on the fortress of Erzerum, carrying along with it the Russian forces.

"The tenth Turkish army corps was then to advance in two columns, the first, including one division, proceeding towards Id by Otl Chal Valley. The second, two divisions strong, was to advance on Ardost through the Servy-Chal Valley. The ninth corps was to take the offensive in the interval between the tenth and eleventh army corps.

"Turkish Advance Checked. "Our troops, in the region of Otl, checked with great courage the Turkish advances, despite the numerical superiority of the enemy, and through a counter-attacks, inflicted heavy losses.

"In the meantime, we detected a strong Turkish column, reinforced by Musman rebels, which was advancing on the Panjoretsk, and Jalagout-chamek passes, in the direction of Ardahan.

"At this point, after holding out for seventeen days, fell back a little to the east.

"Having received reinforcements, we attacked on January 3, the Turkish forces concentrated at Ardahan, and inflicted upon the enemy a complete defeat. We captured the flag of the eighth infantry regiment, a part of the Constantinople garrison.

"During the development of a separate action we discovered that the bulk of the Turkish forces, that is to say, the ninth and tenth army corps, were taking the offensive against Sari Kamaysh. This movement was undertaken through mountain roads and steep passes, buried deep in snow. The Turkish troops were abundantly provided with provisions and war materials. The enemy had planned the operation relying upon the sympathy and help of the natives, who previously had been informed by the Turkish emissaries.

"The task of our troops consisted in holding on the front important forces of the enemy and at the same time in inflicting resistance strong enough to check the ninth and tenth Turkish corps. In spite of the extraordinary difficulties of this, in spite of the rigors of the winter and the necessity of fighting in passes of mountains, rising 10,000 feet and covered with snow, our valiant troops after fierce battle, extending over ten days, fulfilled brilliantly the exceptional task, which had been imposed upon them.

"They repulsed the frantic attacks of the Turks on the flank and in the front, and at Sari Kamaysh enveloped and almost annihilated two Turkish corps. They captured one of these corps with its commander, three division generals

DISCOVERY OF RADIUM NOT OFFICIALLY KNOWN

Department of Mines Must See It in Marketable Quantity.

TORONTO, Jan. 6.—Commenting on a dispatch to the Globe from North Bay, in which it is stated that claims have been made by H. C. Clark and J. H. Diehl for the Ontario Government's \$25,000 reward for the discovery of radium in Ontario, the provincial department of mines says it is not officially aware of the discovery of radium near North Bay.

The department does not recognize a claim until samples have been submitted and passed upon by the provincial assayer and the radium must be found in marketable quantity. The assayer tested samples sent in from North Bay a short time ago, but found nothing.

Medicine Hat Is in Throes of a Gold Rush

MEDICINE HAT, Alta., Jan. 6.—All Medicine Hat is experiencing a miniature gold rush, so claims having been staked three miles north of the city.

DISPUTE OF MANY YEARS IS SETTLED

Controversy Ends Over Ownership of Georgian Bay Islands.

PROVINCE GETS MAJORITY

Manitoulin Group Goes To the Dominion In Trust For Indians.

[Special to The Advertiser.] TORONTO, Jan. 6.—Under an agreement that has just been concluded with the Dominion Government, the long-standing controversy over the ownership of the islands in the Georgian Bay has been settled, and the right of the province to administer the larger portion of the area has been conceded.

This is a matter that has been hanging fire ever since Confederation and involved the interpretation of several Indian treaties. By the terms of the agreement, which has been authorized by orders in council of both Governments, and will be further confirmed by legislation, the right of the province in all islands in Georgian Bay, north and west of Moose Deer Point, except what is known as the Manitoulin group, is granted.

Dominion Holds Manitoulin Group. The Manitoulin group, which consists of Great Manitoulin, Cockburn Fitzwilliam and Barrie Islands—Drummond Island, which was formerly included, having been transferred to the United States in an adjustment of the boundary—is to be held by the Dominion in trust for the Indians, by whom it was surrendered in 1835, under the band treaty, and all moneys derived from sales will be held as a trust fund, the interest from which will be paid to the Indians.

Moose Deer Point is some distance south of Parry Sound on Georgian Bay, and its position in this respect was fixed as marking the limit to which the Indians of the northern country came south to hunt, the Moon River being the line, and the head of Lake Rosseau being the northern point to which the Indians around Lake Simcoe went for game. South of Moose Deer point there are not a great many islands, the greater number lying to the north and west, but whatever islands are south of Moose Deer Point are recognized as belonging to the Dominion Government.

Sale Opened Controversy.

The history of the controversy is interesting. At one time the province claimed ownership in all the islands except the Manitoulin group, but after the question had been taken up, an understanding was reached between Hon. T. B. Pardee, commissioner of crown lands, and Hon. Day, minister of the interior for Canada, naming Moose Deer Point as the line of division. But the sale of LaCloche Island in 1854 by the Dominion Government threw the whole matter into the crucible again, because the province claimed that LaCloche Island was not part of the Manitoulin group, and the dispute widened until the Dominion claimed all the islands in the bay as part of the Manitoulin group, being Indian lands under the band head treaty.

The matter had progressed so far that the province was preparing to institute an action, which would in all probability have gone to the privy council. A temporary arrangement was made with the department of Indian affairs, defining the area practically on the lines of the permanent settlement now made. The matter was later taken up by Hon. W. H. Hearst, who continued the negotiations after he became premier, with what is considered by those best qualified to speak, satisfactory results.

The various disputes between the province and the Dominion arising out of Indian treaties are being gradually settled, and only the question of the Lake Superior islands and the Northwest Angle are now standing.

SWEDEN GETS COPPER SOLELY FROM STATES

Her Importation Exceeds Previous Years Enormously.

LONDON, Jan. 6.—8:29 p.m.—The Swedish Legation today issued a statement concerning copper imports to Sweden, which purports to show an increase of 2,179,374 kilograms (4,794,623 pounds) over 1913, it points out, however, that of this increase 1,523,244 kilograms (3,357,557 pounds) were imported since the war started. This was entirely due to growing domestic consumption, to which the electrification of the street railways and the needs of the army largely contributed.

The statement says the much talked of increase in importations of copper from the United States is not a new phenomenon, but is due to the fact that no copper is now obtainable from Germany, from which country considerable quantities were imported before the war. With the export of copper from Great Britain virtually prohibited, only the United States is left to supply Sweden with the metal.

MAY BUY CHATHAM PLANT

International Harvester Company May Desert Canadian Field.

CHATHAM, Jan. 6.—It is reported that the Chatham plant of the International Harvester Co. is to be sold to the Massey-Harris Company. This may indicate a plan by the Harvester Company to give up Canadian manufacture, leaving the field open to Dominion companies.

CHARGE OF HIGH TREASON

Otto Geller Thought to Have Aided Escape of Enemies.

WINNIPEG, Jan. 6.—Otto Geller, arrested by the military authorities on suspicion of treason, will face trial on that charge, and if found guilty, is liable to be shot. The charge is based on evidence that he assisted Austrian and German reservists to escape from Canada and return to Germany to fight.

HOSPITAL FOR FISHERMEN

Ship Sails for Nova Scotia Coast from Boston.

BOSTON, Jan. 6.—The revenue cutter Androscoogin, recently fitted as a hospital ship for deep sea fishermen, sailed on her first trip to the fishing grounds.

PROVINCE WILL SUE INSURANCE COMPANIES

W. S. Brewster, ex-M. P. P., to Press Claims for Unpaid Taxes.

TORONTO, Jan. 6.—W. S. Brewster, K.C. of Brandon, former member of the Legislature for North Brant, has been appointed by the Ontario Government to take charge of the province's case against the insurance companies, which resist the payment of the provincial tax. The amount involved is about \$145,000.

KILLS WIFE, BOARDER AND SELF.

AKRON, O., Jan. 6.—Charles W. Hyslop, 28, a railroad employee, early today shot and killed his wife, shot J. Schrader, a boarder at the same house, and then turned the revolver on himself, dying instantly.
