New York, Jan. 6.—More than 20,000 allen enemies in the Communist party of New York State alone are openly organized to overthrow the Government by force under the direction of Bolshevik leaders in Russia, according to Senator Clayton R. Lusk, chairman of the joint legislative commission investigating seditious activities today.

NO REDUCTION IN WAGES, BUT SERVICE TO BE CUT, DECISION OF STREET RAILWAY COMPAN

REDS CAN GO Enough Cars To Be Withdrawn To Meet Added Wage Costs -Many Members of Crews Likely To Be Let Out.

The London Street Railway will continue the existing rates of wages, but will withdraw a number of cars "to meet this cost." This removes the poswill withdraw a number of cars "to meet this cost." This removes the possibility of a strike, it is expected.

A conference today between Charles Currie, president of the company, and members of the Street Railwaymen's Union resulted in these decisions.

Manager C. B. King was unable to state how many cars would be withdrawn or when the withdrawal would take effect.

The official statement handed out by the company following the conference was:

"The management of the London Street Railway Company and representatives of its employees, at a conference this morning, considered the situation arising from the refusal of the people to pay the cost of service, as heretofore provided;

"It was decided that the company shall continue to pay existing rates of wages. To meet this added cost, the company will withdraw a sufficient number of cars from operation.

REGISTER ALL AIRCRAFT

Machines Must Bear Marks Designated Under Order in-Council.

Ottawa, Jan. 6 .- Regulations, to been approved by the governor-incertificates to pilots, without which no person can fly in Canada. These certificates are obtainable only after applicants have satisfied the board that they are qualified to operate a machine and have also passed a medical ex amination. In the case of pilots operating machines for commercial purposes, medical examinations must be passed every six months, and in the case of private filers, every twelve months.

All registered aircraft are subject to the call of the state in time of war, and all persons holding commercial pilou's certificates become, during a war period, members of the Canadian Air Force. All air harbors are subject to the control of the military authorities during war time. Machines must bear certain marks which are clearly indicated in the regulations, and sero-dromes and seaplane station are also marked. No passenger aircraft is permitted to carry any explosives, and mails shall not be carried without the written authority of the postmaster-

eneral.

A private pilot's certificate does not uthorize the holder to fly for hire or for any reward except a prize in contest. He must, before taking a passenger, have at least ten hours solo flying, and must make at least five flights of stipulated heights and distances, before being counted eligible for a certificate.
