AUTO WENT OVER BANK AND BURNED

Tourists Lose Clothes and Money in Accident Near Tillsonburg.

TILLSONBURG, July 5.—The first serious motor accident of this season in this district happened during the night, when a car with license number 123-556 rolled over a bank near Tillsonburg and was totally destroyed. Three occupants, all young men, whose names could not be learned, were returning to Detroit after a vacation in Toronto and Simcoe.

At the point of the accident, thinking they were on the wrong road, they started to turn around, when the back wheels slipped over a cement culvert, dropping fourteen feet to the water below and taking fire instantly. The occupants lost two suits of clothes, a considerable amount of American money and valuable papers. The road is very dangerous at this point, and unprotected either by railing or signs. It is a provincial highway.

TRUSTEE SMITH NOT CHAMPIONING RIGHTS OF SCHOOL CHILDREN

Public Schools Open September 1, As Already Scheduled.

Insisting that he was merely prompted by the school inspector and not championing the cause of the youngsters "right off his own bat," Trustee Smith, at Tuesday's meeting of the board of education moved that the public schools reopen on September 6 the same day as the collegiate institute and the Borden Milk Company plant, and the opening of the school on September 1, as already scheduled.

The trustee found no "backers" and not a few objectors. The public school opening is set for Thursday, September 1, and it was pointed out that it was hardly worth while to set the "old bell tolling the sad news" just for two days, while the collegiate did not reopen until the following Tuesday.

Trustee Howe, however, took vigorous objection. Fair week comes after that," he asserted, sarcastically, "so you might as well not open until October 1. The law requires us to have 200 school days you know." No second opinion could be found, and the motion was dropped. "I'm satisfied," commented Trustee Smith.

WILL OPEN NEGOTIATIONS FOR OILING OF PIPE LINE ROAD BY THE COUNTY

Motor Club Officials Plan to Take Immediate Action in Matter.

Negotiations will be opened immediately by officials of the London Motor Club with County Engineer C. Talbot with the view to oiling the Pipe Line road from the end of the pavement to Springbank Park. At a meeting of the executive of that organization held Monday, it was decided that the club should bear a portion of the cost, as previously suggested, if the expenditure were not too great.

Secretary E. Bernard of the club endeavored to get in touch with Mr. Talbot this morning, but that official was out of town. It is Mr. Bernard's desire to get the county's estimate of the cost. If this cost is not too great, the Motor Club will be willing to bear one-third of the cost, which the county engineer claimed would be the city's share if the work was undertaken.

During the prevailing hot spell, the Pipe Line road has become drier and dustier than ever. At the present time, according to members of the club, there is very little pleasure in motoring to the park because of the choking dust that fills the air.

The suggestion that the road should be oiled was made more than a week ago, when Mr. Bernard stated that the club would endeavor to have the road oiled. Since that time Mr. Talbot has said that the county would be willing to undertake the work if someone would bear the city's share.

Figures secured from City Engineer Brazier placed the cost of the work at \$600 a mile, which would amount to a

total of \$1,200 from the pavement to the gates of the park, and \$1,800 if the road was oiled all the way to the amusement park.

Endeavors will be made to increase the membership of the Motor Club to 1,000 to facilitate the work. At present it numbers 776.

CLAN M'KAY MEMBERS MEET AT KINTORE

Annual Gathering Was Attended by 160 From the District.

HAMILTON, July 5.—There is a serious loss of cherries in the Grimsby and Niagara districts as a result of the prolonged heat spell. The fruit has ripened so rapidly that the growers have been unable to keep pace in picking and shipping, and consequently a great quantity is spoiling. The loss will be heavy if the weather does not turn cool in a day or two.

ENFORCEMENT OF ANTI-GLARE LAW UP TO THE PROVINCIAL OFFICIALS

Opinion Expressed by W. J. Tallent Does Not Blame Local Police.

"We have a law governing strong headlights, and it should be enforced," declared D. J. Tallent, of the housing commission, today discussing the recent accident on the county road near Lambeth.

"I am not attempting to criticize the local police," continued Mr. Tallent, "but I am of the opinion that it is up to the provincial authorities as well, that the law is rigidly adhered to. An offence of this nature is, to my mind, more serious than theft. The night of the accident near Lambeth, for instance, I am among those who were forced to come to a complete stop to allow the car that did the damage pass by us. We could not see to move safely because of its strong headlights. In addition to this it rushed past us fully fifty miles an hour."

"Of course, there are dozens of cars from over the border coming this way with these strong lights and it shows a certain laxity on the part of the officials at the boundary points. But it is not only the foreign cars. I can take anyone out and down the main streets of London and pick out local cars carrying lights of the same strength."

"In the county the authorities should experience little difficulty in bringing these offenders to time. They can see these cars approaching for an appreciable distance and can intercept them with comparative ease."

"We have the law, and it should be enforced," he concluded.

DONATION OF TWO BOOKS TO LIBRARY

Mr. F. E. Leonard has given to the public library two very interesting and valuable guide books of the western front, one dealing with the city of Ypres and the battlefields round about in which the Canadians played a noteworthy part, and the other being a complete atlas and directory to all the hundreds of cemeteries where the dead of the great war are buried. These books may be consulted at any time in the reference department of the library.

Among recent additions of special importance at the library are Von Hindenburg's two voluminous memoirs, entitled "My Life," Lytton Strachey's much-heralded life of Queen Victoria; Wells' "Salvaging of Civilization," already stirring controversy; O'Reilly's "How France Built Her Cathedrals," one of the most beautiful books of the year; the first two volumes of Corbett's official naval history of the war; Ford's "Evolution of Parliament," for best book that has yet appeared on the British Parliament; Smith's "History of the Postoffice in British North America"; Agnes Laut's "The Trade of America, Middleton's "South Sea Foam," and many other volumes in all fields of literature.

PRESBYTERY WILL SETTLE CHURCH ROW

Special Meeting Called To Deal With Pastor's Resignation.

TORONTO, July 5.—An attempt to settle and clear up all matters in connection with the dispute in West Presbyterian Church will be made at a special meeting of the Toronto Presbytery which has been called to meet at St. James' Square Presbyterian Church on Thursday, July 14.

Rev. W. R. McKay's resignation will be considered, which was received and tabled at the last special meeting held a week or so ago. The whole question will be gone into, it is understood, for there is considerable difference of opinion as to Mr. McKay leaving following the resignation of Rev. Dr. J. A. Turnbull. Many of the congregation who have stood by Mr. McKay throughout the dispute now want him to remain in charge, and will support their request before the Presbytery.

It is understood that supporters of Mr. McKay are bringing pressure to bear upon him to remain, but when questioned today Mr. McKay was silent. He would not discuss the question of whether he would withdraw his resignation or not. It seems to be the opinion that the matter will be left entirely in the hands of Presbytery for decision.

At the special meeting the Presbytery will be asked to sanction the calls of Bonar Presbyterian Church to Rev. Norman McEachren, of Smiths Falls, and Rev. Dr. H. T. Wallace of Kingston, to Glebe Church, North Toronto.

WHO IS KEEPING MILK PRICE UP?

Three Cents Difference Between Tillsonburg and Ingersoll Figures.

INGERSOLL, July 5.—That local milk dealers should be prepared to accept a lower profit is the opinion of Councillor Buchanan, who took the initiative in asking the council to investigate the situation. A committee was appointed for this purpose, to report as early as possible.

Councillor Buchanan claimed to have positive information that milk was being bought from the producers at \$1.15 per hundred pounds and retailed at \$1.18. Tillsonburg, he understood, had the benefit of milk at seven cents a quart, while the price remains at ten cents a quart in Ingersoll.
