## Professors Favor Search For Mastodon At Simcoe

Search Field Near Wyecombe For Further Traces of Monster.

**TOOTH IS FOUND**  
Western University Men Are Much Interested in Development.

Simcoe, June 9.—Dr. A. D. Robertson, professor of biology, and Professor J. W. Russell, professor of zoology, both of Western University, London, arrived in Simcoe today, and accompanied by Dr. W. A. McIntosh and Captain Ralph Smith, motored to Wyecombe to examine the spot where the mastodon tooth was found that Dr. McIntosh recently presented to the Western University.

The tooth was found by Charles Hunter in a field on his farm near Wyecombe. The field is covered with a black soil, obviously composed of vegetable matter, to a depth of two or three feet. Beneath this soil is a bed of hard quicksand, and the supposition that a mastodon had sunk in this quicksand seemed a very probable one.

The professors found the prospects of discovering other remains of a mastodon in this field quite promising, and will recommend that excavations be undertaken by the university in the near future.

Professor Russell is of the opinion that the date of the extinction of the mastodon is more recent than is generally believed. He thinks that the last of them were killed by Indians not more than 500 or 1,000 years ago. He refers to certain traditions among the Indians and to the remarkable state of preservation of some of the relics found, including the tooth found at Wyecombe.

Mr. Hunter found the tooth between one and two years ago, and not knowing the significance of the find, gave it to Sidney Davis, who sold it to Dr. McIntosh for five dollars. Dr. McIntosh in turn presented it to the Western University a few months ago.

## SCHOOL GROUNDS CAUSE OF DEBATE

Discussion Over Ruling On Control of School Play Grounds.

Short discussions on three or four matters that had been turned over at the last session of trustees and the passing of accounts occupied a brief session of the finance committee of the board of education last evening.

Six applications for positions on the public school teaching staff were turned over to Inspector Greer. At present there are no openings on the staff, though several changes have been made for the new term.

Trustee Mrs. Rose asked for a ruling on the question of school playgrounds. A complainant had been very angry when ejected from the grounds and wanted to know what special permission was needed. Secretary W. A. Tanner pointed out that a permit could be secured from the board's office any time if assurance was given that responsible person would direct any play after 6 o'clock in the evening.

The question had aroused some discussion among the school playgrounds as people using the grounds after 6 o'clock were in danger of ejection by city policemen.

Trustee E. F. Copeland brought up the matter of public school support for a symphony orchestra, which was expected to appear in the city during October. A special performance for school children had been mooted in an effort to make the visit of a party of noted musicians more expensive. The matter will be taken up by the board if a request is made.

The committee recommended that as little publicity as possible be given to truancy cases, in order that wayward pupils get a good opportunity for a second chance.

## TECHNICAL PUPILS AWARDED PRIZES

Harry Reynolds, Elgie Walton and Louisa Johnston Receive Honors.

**SHORT PROGRAM**

Honors won by three students of the Technical High School were awarded yesterday afternoon, when a short program of speech-making was given before the assembled classes of all the school. Harry Reynolds, who won the intermediate Wossie athletic championship, was presented with a fine gold watch; Louisa Johnston, first in household arts, received a check, and Elgie Walton, most proficient of the school in draughting, was given a handsome set of draughting tools.

Shortly before 4 o'clock classes were assembled, and Principal H. B. Beal spoke briefly, in tribute to the pupils who had brought credit to the institution. Usually, he said, all presentations were made on commencement day in the autumn. There were special reasons why these three prizes be given out at the early date, however.

Chairman A. N. Udy of the advisory vocational education committee, was introduced to make the presentation to Elgie Walton. Mr. Udy remembered that the Technical School was handicapped without a symposium, but just the same had made a fine showing in athletics. The boys had done especially well under the handicap and had made good use of the privileges of the Y.M.C.A. He commended pupils who had excelled in other lines of work. "It all tends for better manhood and womanhood and for better citizenship. He then presented Walton with the handsome set of tools, donated by George S. Trudell.

Rev. J. Bruce Hunter presented Harry Reynolds with the gold watch, which had been provided for through subscriptions of students of the school in honor of Reynolds' success in the Wossie meet. Rev. Mr. Hunter lauded competitive sports and school studies, and held out the provisions made for Rhodes' scholarships as an aim for all students. "You are if you're working for such a scholarship and you will make better citizens," he declared. "Be a good sport, a hard worker and a cheerful loser."

Miss Louisa Johnston was presented with a check for \$25 for greatest proficiency in dressmaking and millinery. The prize came from the firm of Smallman & Ingram. This also was presented by Rev. Mr. Hunter, who spoke with equal appreciativeness of the merits of household arts.

## WILLIAM J. SMITH, JR., DIES IN LOS ANGELES

Former Londoner Passes Away After Long Period of Illness.

Word of the death of W. J. Smith, Jr., son of the late W. J. Smith of Smith, Son & Clarke, funeral directors, in Los Angeles, Sunday, has been received by his mother, Mrs. W. J. Smith, 647 Waterloo street, this city. Interment will take place this afternoon in Hollywood Cemetery.

The late Mr. Smith moved to Los Angeles six years ago, where he entered the furniture business. Following a slight operation a month ago, his health gradually grew worse, although his illness was not considered serious. Word of his death Sunday, therefore, came as a distinct shock to his family and will cause a feeling of deep regret over a wide circle of friends in London and district.

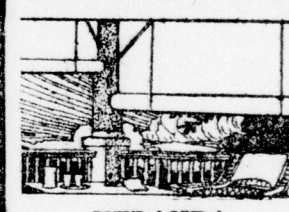

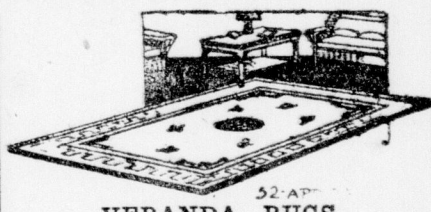

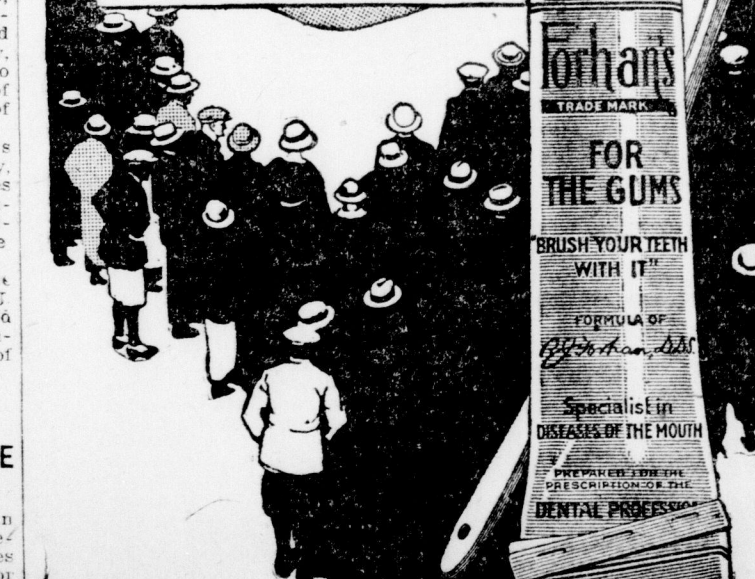
