STRIKERS BACK TO JOBS TIME-LIMIT IS PLACED

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men who had been engaged to take the strikers' places, and who were promised permanent work. While the strikers have been taken back, it is subject to a ruling by the government as to whether they will be allowed to resume their work permanently.

PETERBORO RETURNS.

Peterboro, June 20.—Following a meeting that lasted until 1:30 this morning the postal workers of Peterboro abandoned the strike instituted on Wednesday night. At 8 o'clock this morning they were all on duty and mail carriers left on their routes at the regular time. Postmaster John Corkery and his assistant, Charles Lachey, with a stenographer, kept the wheels moving yesterday and last night so that no tieup occurred.

KINGSTON MEN BACK.

Kingston, June 20.—Every employee at the local postoffice was at work this morning following the strike of yesterday afternoon, the men deciding at a meeting held last night that they would return and await decisions arrived at by the postal authorities at Ottawa and officials of the Dominion Federation of Postal Employees.

BROCKVILLE ON DUTY.

Brockville, June 20.—Although the vote among local postal employees was reported to have been unanimously in favor of a walkout as a protest against the proposed wage adjustment, all clerks and letter carriers attached to the staff of the Brockville postoffice are remaining on duty and reported for work this morning as usual.

MOSHER DENIES RUMOR.

Ottawa, June 20.—Rumors that an order had been issued to members of the Brotherhood of Railroad Employees to return to work after a strike of the postal employees, were denied by A. R. Mosher, president of the brotherhood. He stated that he had issued a suggestion to railway officials that railway employees should not be asked to act in the place of striking postal employees or in other words to act as strikebreakers.

REINSTATE MEN.

Montreal, June 20.—Victor Gaudet, postmaster of Montreal, was called from the postmaster general's department in Ottawa today on the long distance telephone and given permission to reinstate all strikers who might present themselves for employment.

KITCHENER STILL OUT.

Kitchener, June 20.—After a meeting here this morning local letter-carriers and postal clerks decided to remain on strike, according to a statement given out at noon today by A. A. Pinke, secretary of the local organization of postal workers. Secretary Pinke stated that the men voted 100 per cent to remain on strike.

Postmaster Lindner stated this morning that there was little change in the situation at the local postoffice. He declared he had hired two new men who, with the four of the old staff still on the job, would be sufficient to carry on until the railway mail service is more fully resumed.

Waterloo's postmaster reports that the entire staff is on the job. That Waterloo men take the view that they were never officially notified to strike.

BRANTFORD MEN BACK.

Brantford, June 20.—At 10:20 a.m. it was announced that a wire had been received from Ottawa to take back the strikers unconditionally, and the men at once took up their normal duties.

WEST STILL ON JOB.

Winnipeg, June 20.—Railway mail clerks in Western Canada are still on their runs, according to officials of the Railway Mail Clerks' Association this morning.

"No action has been taken towards following the lead of eastern striking postal men," declared T. J. Kneebone, secretary of the Manitoba branch of the association, while W. Gardner, president, declared that the situation was unchanged throughout the district pending further developments today.

VANCOUVER STICKS.

Vancouver, June 20.—There will be no postal strike in Vancouver for the next 48 hours at least, it is the men having passed a resolution at a mass meeting here last night to defer action until further word is received of proposals made by the government.

EDMONTON BUSY.

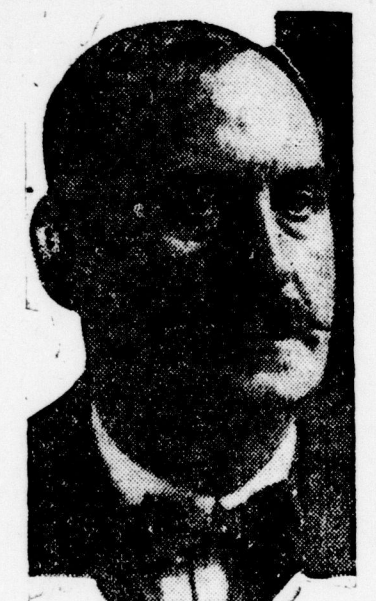

Edmonton, June 20.—The local postoffice employees have not made any further move in regard to the threatened general strike. It was learned late last night from E. Curry, secretary of the local postal workers, if necessary, a strike vote will be taken today to decide the stand to be taken here.

NOT TO BE REINSTATE.

Montreal, June 20.—None of the striking Montreal postal employees will be reinstated in their places. Postmaster Victor Gaudet announced last night, "So far as the Montreal postoffice is concerned we have finished with the strikers," Mr. Gaudet said. "We regard them as having left their employment and we are busy training new men to take their places. This will be speedily accomplished and by the beginning of next week all the services will be back to normal, including the street delivery service." A number of strikers appeared at the main postoffice last night and asked to be reinstated in their places. They were refused. All others who have left their employment will be dealt with in the same manner.

HAMILTON ENDS STRIKE.

Hamilton, June 19.—Hamilton's striking postal employees voted to return to work today, and the men were back at their jobs at midnight tonight when J. E. Archer, secretary of the Dominion Federation of Postal Employees, informed the workers at a mass meeting held in the Labor Temple that the govern-



ment had admitted in writing that postal salaries as recommended by the civil service commission were totally inadequate. The night staff left the meeting to return to work at the postoffice.

It was further announced that all the men who left their jobs were to be reinstated.

That the government would introduce legislation immediately to re-open the whole salary question was the announcement made by Mr. Archer at the meeting.

"What will become of the men who were engaged to take the places of the employees who were out?" Postmaster Webber was asked.

"They were hired this morning at \$5 a month," he said.

Asked if they would be entitled to one month's pay, Mr. Webber repeated his statement that they had been hired for the month. It appears as if the men who took one delivery of mail this afternoon will be entitled to claim their full month's pay, even though their services are no longer required.

In Hamilton a staff of 140 was engaged and the government is faced with an expenditure of \$11,900.

WORK AT STRATFORD.

Stratford, June 19.—Stratford today was affected but little as a result of the postal men's strike. Stratford postmen are staying on the job, deciding at a meeting last night that this was the wisest course for the present in view of the fact that no word had been received from headquarters.

Distribution of both incoming and outgoing mail matter continued as normal and locally there was little apparent indication of the complete demoralization that is reported from many other cities.

VOTE AGAINST STRIKE.

Saskatoon, June 19.—Sunday's strike ballot among postal workers here was 55 to 25 against a walkout. It was learned today. Employees in all branches of the service stated disinclination to follow the lead of the east.

"There are 16,000 former British postal employees in Canada today ready to step into our jobs," said one union official.

REGINA AT WORK.

Regina, June 19.—There are no developments in connection with the postal workers here. Not a man has gone out on strike and no statement has been issued by the western headquarters of the men.

AT WORK IN CALGARY.

Calgary, June 19.—There is no chance of a strike here, according to the postmaster. Many applicants are waiting for jobs.

ST THOMAS RETURNS.

St. Thomas, June 19.—St. Thomas postal workers returned to work this afternoon and are making a partial delivery, according to information given out by Postmaster Dunsmore. Mr. Dunsmore stated that the men were learning that Owen Sound and Stratford posties had returned, reconsidered the matter and agreed to go back to work.

GUELPH DECLARES ACTION.

Guelph, June 19.—After a two-hour meeting held tonight, the local postoffice clerks and letter carriers decided to take no action regarding a walkout until such time as the majority of the employees considered it advisable to call another meeting. Although no statement was given out regarding the decision at tonight's meeting it was the general feeling that the men would not go out on strike. There are 37 employees in the Guelph office, including clerks and 22 letter carriers.

REFUSE TO STRIKE.

Halifax, June 19.—With the announcement tonight by the head of the Railway Mail Clerks in Nova Scotia, that they would not go out on strike, and a statement from the head of the other postal employees that they would not obey the strike order, it was decided that there will be no strike in this district.

J. DE SELVES IS APPOINTED FRENCH SENATE CHIEF

Paris, June 20.—Justin de Selves, recently elected minister of the interior in the short-lived Francois-Marsol cabinet, was yesterday elected president of the senate to succeed M. Doumergue, who resigned to become president of France. M. de Selves' cabinet was watered yesterday by M. Bienvenu-Martin, former minister of labor. M. de Selves received 151 votes and M. Bienvenu-Martin 134.

FIREMAN IS KILLED.

St. Albans, Vt., June 20.—Fireman William Forbes was killed and two others were injured when a freight train collided head on with the Washington-Montreal express on the Central Vermont Railway in Sharon early today. No passengers were injured.
