Report From Census Office Shows Acreage and Condition of Crops

WHEAT INCREASE IN PRAIRIE COUNTRY

Backward Spring Prevents Farmers Sowing Grain -+ Early Date

Ottawa, June 24.—The census and statistics office has today issued a report on the crops and live stock of Canada, as reported to date of June 15. In all parts of Canada farm operations have been delayed this year. The months of April and May were cold and wet, and farmers were unable to get on their land until late. Fall wheat that had been sown suffered much injury from hard frosts, and spring operations have been two to three weeks later than usual.

Yet the reports from all the provinces are very satisfactory. Grain crops and grasses are growing thriftily, and excepting in some localities of the maritime provinces, where the rainfall has been light, there is promise of an excellent harvest.

NEAR SUFFOCATION

Grain Loaders on Steamship at Mon-treal Nearly Killed by Negligence

Montreal, June 24.—Buried in the midships grain bunker of the steamship Lake Manitoba, 16 men last night narrowly escaped a horrible death. For four hours they lay on top of the heaps of wheat under the decks, forgotten by their fellows, and only sustaining life by taking turns at breathing under the narrow ventilator pipes.


