Editorial Note. I use by the paper this morning a suggestion about relieving the regiments in the Northwest. What I would suggest in regard to my own regiment—the 10th Royal—is this:

There are 250 men in the 10th Royal Grenadiers at the front, and between 150 and 200 in Toronto. A number of those who went to the front did not expect to be absent so long, and their families and businesses are suffering by their absence.

It is to be seen that the men who are left in Toronto it would enable those who would like to return to come back, and the regiment would be as strong as it is now. If when the men arrive there the position was such as every man would be needed, it would bring the regiment on a par with other regiments.

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In the matter of the Short Line railway, which is to connect Quebec and Montreal with Halifax and St. John, the Dominion government may well be puzzled for a solution.

The following are the names of the various routes very little shorter than the existing one by the Intercolonial, but which were supported by sectional and political influences.

A God's country for Debtors. By the new act passed by the Manitoba legislature no execution can be enforced unless the debtor is in possession of property, real and personal over \$2000. And then only on the property in excess of that amount. Judgment summonses are abolished.

On Wednesday the minister of finance called from New York, and the Monetary Times thus speaks of his mission: "Sir Leonard Tilley, accompanied by Mr. Courtney, goes to England to look after the impending Ocean loan. To pay off the \$25,000,000 falling due next month and for other purposes, from \$55,000,000 to \$60,000,000 will be required. If the \$25,000,000 of debt now due be renewed, the amount to be borrowed will be reduced to \$35,000,000, or perhaps below it; but, less than \$35,000,000 would scarcely be a safe amount. The extent of the expense in connection with the inscription of the Northwest cannot be foreseen, but it may go into the millions. The American Sioux war of 1862, with a much smaller number of troops in the field than we have now, cost the round sum of \$10,000,000, but the campaign was carried into the second year. If the loan can be confined to \$30,000,000, or even \$35,000,000, it should be possible to make it on terms that will not be unduly onerous."

Tuesday appears to have been New Brunswick's day in the house, in the interminable debate on the franchise bill. On that day speeches were made by Messrs. Waldon, Mitchell, Gilmore, Burgess, Barnes, Landry, Irvine and Foster, all N. B. members. Mr. Waldon moved that his own province be exempted from the operation of the bill, which was lost by 36 to 74.

The Montreal Gazette's correspondent says that the debate on the New Brunswick amendment brought out the striking superiority in talent, logic, and breadth of view of the conservative representatives from that province over those of the opposition. In the present parliament, as respects the ministerial side, the New Brunswick members, relative to numbers, are by far the ablest in the house. Sir Leonard Tilley, Hon. Mr. Mitchell, Hon. Mr. Costigan, Messrs. Landry, Foster, Wood, and Barnes are the equal in debating power of any like number of representatives from any other province, and New Brunswick has reason to be proud of her conservative contingent.

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
