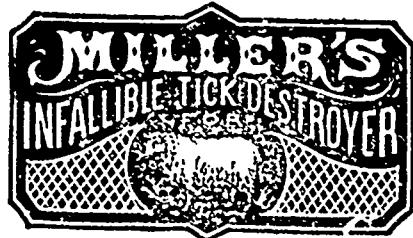

Markets.

Toronto Markets.

"CANADA FARMER" Office, Sept. 15, 1866.

THERE has been very little business transacted during the week for want of stocks. The general produce movement is, however, expected soon fully to set in, and a great relief and increased transactions in almost every branch of trade will follow.

Flour.—During the week flour has advanced 60c to 75c and still tends upwards. Very little has been offering, sales of No. 1 are reported at from \$6 60 to \$7; extra has been offering at from \$6 75 to \$7; and superior at \$7 50, with, however, very few transactions, buyers being unwilling to pay these prices.

Wheat.—The wheat market, in sympathy with Montreal, has slightly advanced. There has, however, been very little offering, stocks in the hands of dealers being almost nil. A lot of old spring sold at \$1 42. New spring sold at \$1 23. A lot of new midge-proof brought \$1 30, and \$1 00 was paid on the street. A lot of old midge-proof sold at \$1 35.

Oats.—Transactions have been confined to the street market, although several lots were offering on 'Change at 33c, without drawing a bid. Prices on the street have ranged from 28c to 30c in the early part of the week. Within the past three days 26c to 27c was only bid.

Barley.—Receipts of this grain have improved, and prices have advanced from 8c to 10c. As high as 60c has been paid within the past two days, and 45c to 52c in the early part of the week.

Peas.—Transactions have been confined to the street market. Sales were made at from 53c to 54c.

Rye.—Very little has been offering. Street price 50c per bushel. Provisions.—The market has been dull and priceless. Butter is lower and now sells at 17 1/2 to 16. Eggs are unchanged at 10 1/2c for shipping lots. Hocks of Bacon are very light, and prices are nominally \$1 12 to 12 1/2c. Mess Pork \$23 50 to \$23 75, prime mess \$21 to \$22. Lard has been scarce and selling at from 15c to 16c.

LATEST OILY EXCHANGE REPORT.

Flour.—Receipts, 43 barrels. Market very firm—very little offering—good demand for all grades. Sales 100 barrels No. 1 at \$7, 200 at 65 only, and at \$7, 65 only bid. Some superior offered at \$7 50.

Wheat.—Receipts, 600 bushels. Sales 150 bushels midge-proof and spring at \$1 25. No white wheat offering.

Oats.—No receipts by cars, receipts by teams liberal. Selling at from 26c to 27c.

Barley.—Receipts large. A lot of 450 bushels offered on 'Change at 56c, 52c only bid. As high as 60c was paid on the street this morning.

Peas.—No receipts. Prices nominal at 53c to 54c.

Provisions.—Market dull.

Montreal Markets, Sept. 12.—Laidlaw, Middleton & Co., report—Flour—Receipts, 230 barrels. Market firmer, consequent on light stock and small arrivals. Very choice extra sold at \$7 50; new superfine at \$7 32 1/2, old Welland Canal at \$7 20, city brands at \$7 25, extra at \$7 15, and at \$7 10. Rye Flour, at \$4 70 to \$4 80. Wheat, nominal. Corn—Sales at 65c with freight. Oats—No sales. Peas—Carload at 80c per 60 lbs. Ashes—First lots at \$5 70 to \$5 72 1/2, inferiors at \$5 25, Pearls at \$7. Butter dull. Pork—Mess at \$25 50.

Milwaukee, Sept. 12.—Receipts—Wheat 41,000 bushels; No. 1 f. o. b. very firm, at \$2 03 to \$2 09, No. 2 f. o. b., at \$1 86 Flour, equal to No. 1 Montreal inspection, \$10 00 to \$10 25. Freight on wheat to Kingston 16c.

Chicago, Sept. 12.—Wheat—Receipts 75,000 bushels. No. 1 f. o. b. credited and higher, at \$2 11 to \$2 12, No. 2 f. o. b. at \$1 90 to \$1 92. Corn firm at 67 1/2c to 68c. Receipts 121,000 bush.
