S. S. Wood, Rector of Three Rivers, and chaplain to the Lord Bishop, after which his Lordship proceeded to deliver his charge, which will shortly be published. Fifty-eight Clergymen were present, and answered to their names, besides the three chaplains who were in attendance upon the Bishop, and two retired missionaries, with one Clergyman from the Diocese of

IRELAND. Mr. O'Dougherty was arrested in Cashel on Monday, and Mr Mengher's apprehension caused the utmost excitement in Waterford, the Chapel bells were rung and thousands of the confederates assembled; it required all the authority and influence of the gifted and chivalrous captive, aided by the Roman Catholic elergy, to prevent the people from falling on the military and police.
