Mr. Hamilton (Qu'Appelle): I am very glad to be able to correct any false impression of this nature. The original offer made on January 7 is still the same. The reaction of seven provinces has been enthusiastic and completely co-operative. The negotiations that are being carried on with the government of Ontario are very active both at the ministerial level and at the official level. As a matter of fact, the very fine mining and access roads program of the Ontario government has been an inspiration, I believe, to all provinces in the matter of opening up resource areas.

I think I have caught the main points of the hon. member's question. If not, I will answer further.
