Mr. Speaker: Order, please. The hon. member for Crowfoot (Mr. Horner) has the floor.

Mr. J. H. Horner (Crowfoot): Mr. Speaker, I rise to speak on the three motions presently being debated with respect to Bill C-203, particularly the one providing that election campaign funds should be Canadian funds and should come directly from Canadian sources. While I realize there might be difficulty in determining what is a Canadian source, I must admit that I am inclined to support that part of the motion. It is not a question of whether it can be implemented. Quite often in politics it is not necessarily a question of what you are doing but of how the voter perceives that you have done it. We have already laid down certain laws with respect to foreign investment in Canada. We will allow only 10 per cent foreign investment in our banks, and none in our newspapers and other news media. Surely, as a parliament, we should be proud to declare that money spent on the election of members to this House should come from Canadian
