This has encouraged American silver dealers to conserve the silver which has already arrived in this country for the purpose of sale. On the other hand, it has caused other neutral countries to expedite their requirements in advance."

MURDERER'S REPRIEVE WAS SENT TOO LATE

Italian Sentenced to Be Hanged, Shot Dead When Trying to Escape.

OTTAWA, Feb. 18.—Romolo Casarri, an Italian who was under sentence to be hanged at Whitehorse, Yukon Territory, today for murder, made a dash for liberty and was shot down by Constable Hayes of the Northwest Mounted Police. The two shots took effect and Casarri died.

A telegram had been just received by the minister of justice stating that the murderer's sentence had been commuted to be hanged. Casarri made his attempt to escape before the news was conveyed to him.

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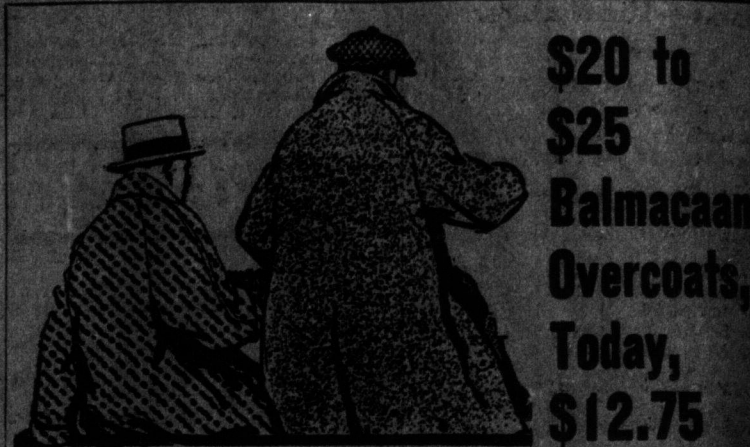
