THE ONTARIO ELECTIONS

The Ross Government Comes Out of the Fierce Contest With a Working Majority.

FINAL RETURNS STAND 53 TO 46.

TORONTO, May 29.—The complete returns give the Liberals 52, the Conservatives 45, with Manitoulin to be heard from. There being no telegraphic or telephonic communication through this constituency, it will probably not be heard from complete until tomorrow. In Manitoulin returns so far received, Gurney, Conservative, has nearly 300 majority.

The complete returns in West Huron show Cameron, Liberal, is elected by 61 majority.

The constituencies which changed over and the way the recently created

seats went are as follows: Conservative Gains—Bruce Centre, Essex North, Lambton West, London, Nipissing East, Norfolk North, Northumberland East, Ottawa, Oxford South, South St. Marie, (new constituency), Wellington South, York West. Total, 12.

Liberal gains—Durham West, Fort William, (new constituency), Middlesex East, Nipissing West, (new constituency), Port Arthur, (new constituency), Prince Edward, Simcoe East, Simcoe Centre, Stormont, Wentworth North. Total 10.

CAPE BRETON RAILWAY.

The collapse of the Webb-Meyer Syndicate Will Not Affect the Road.

MONTREAL, May 29.—Edmund Green, & Co. has returned from New York, where he went in connection with the Cape Breton railway, now in course of construction. He says the collapse of the Webb-Meyer syndicate will in no way affect the future of the project. Dr. Webb tendered his resignation, which was accepted, and Mr. R. J. Campbell was appointed in his place and that gentleman now has full charge and is pushing the work of construction.

SCHOLES CHAMPION.

New York's Crack Single Sculler Defeated by Canadian Champion.

NEW YORK, May 30.—The most important event at the annual regatta of the Harlem Regatta Association was the single scull race between Titus, the New York crack, and Louis Scholes, of Toronto, the Canadian champion. The race was won by Scholes. Both men are scheduled to take part in the Henley regatta for the diamond sculls.

C. P. R. TELEGRAPHERS.

It is announced that the difficulty between the telegraphers and the management of the C. P. R. has been amicably settled. While the telegraphers did not obtain the minimum wages demanded the company made substantial concessions.

Excellent Concert.

A very pleasant entertainment was held in the Free Baptist church last evening under the auspices of the Young People's Society. Miss Rogers, of St. John, took a leading part in the programme and her readings were much enjoyed. This was the first occasion on which Miss Rogers had been heard in this city and her return will be received with delight.

The Acting Premier.

It is pretty generally understood that Attorney General Pugsley will today be appointed acting Premier during the absence at the coronation of Premier Tweeddale.

Entered for the Races.

John McCoy's horse Calandra was sent to St. Stephen today to be fitted for the races there on July 1st and at Calais on the 4th.

Married Last Evening.

Mrs. Mary Mersberg and Mr. Robert Clark, both of this city, were married last evening by Rev. G. B. Payson at the residence of the latter.

GOVERNMENT MEETING.

Smallpox Matters Discussed, and Board of Education in Session.

The local government is in session today. This morning Drs. E. B. Fisher, chairman of the Provincial Board of Health, and D. D. McDonald, of Pet- ticoles, were heard respecting the smallpox accounts of Westmorland county. It was stated by Dr. McDonald that the County Council had cut the accounts down to an unjustly small amount and he wished the government to order the Council to pay the accounts as passed upon by the Chairman of the Board of Health. As all the accounts had not been certified to by the chairman the matter stood over until the next meeting of the government.

A meeting of the Board of Education is being held this afternoon. Mr. W. A. Mott and Mr. T. M. Burns, M. P.'s are here and will interview the government respecting matters in connection with certain timber limits. There will be another meeting this evening and the members of government expect to go to St. John by train tomorrow morning.

KILBURN'S DRIVE.

Reached Corporation Limits Last Night—Other Drives Coming On.

CONSUMERS, May 30.—Kilburn's drive of about 5,000,000 reached corporation limits last night. The other drives are coming along well and it is now certain that but very little lumber will be hung up on the Upper St. John. The corporation drive is now one mile above St. Leonard's.
