### Asbury's Journal.

these volumes will be found the beginnings (almost) of the history of Methodism in America; and, as such, their value is incalculable to the Church.
But as a record of apostolic zeal and fidelity, of a spirit of self-sacrifice
rivalling that of the seints and martyrs of the early Church, of an industry
which no tolis could weary, of a patience which no privations could exhaust,
it is full of interest to every minister of the gospel, and to every Christian.
