

MILK COMMITTEE AGAINST INCREASE

None to Consumers, But
Farmers' Price Increased
to \$3.10.

Milk wholesale has been fixed for the ensuing two months at \$3.10 the 33 quart cwt. by Maj. Duncan, the sub-committee of the board of commerce and milk, retail, will still sell at thirteen ticks, the dollar, winter schedule. This decision of the committee was made known yesterday. The report, which was unanimous, reads in full: "The conclusion of the committee is that an interim order covering a period of two months ending Nov. 30 of this year should be made allowing the producer \$3.10 per can of condensed milk delivered to the dairy. consent of all those representing the producers to permit automatic reductions in price whenever the cost of production is shown to be less than the cost of the milk by the use of the methods by which the decrease of the cost of production can be estimated as is as follows: Taking the figures for the cost of production of milk as the cost of the feed ration at today's prices for the average milk producing cow \$1.98, and taking the figures supplied by Professor Leitch showing that reduction in the cost of this feed ration is just about one-half in the purchase price of milk to the farmer, the dairy the committee recommends that as soon as the cost of these feeds is reduced to \$1.00, there shall be \$1.98 an automatic reduction of one cent on the price of a can of milk at the dairy shall be made from the date of the reduction of the feed subject to their correctness as given by Professor Leitch, who is not present today. The understanding is that a reduction of one cent shall be made in place to the vicinity of \$2.75 as soon as market prices of the feeds above are reduced to justify it. This vicinity of \$2.75 being the highest price of the permit of the sale of 14 pint tickets to the \$1 retail. Thirteen tickets for one dollar and one cent will be sold for who is paying \$2.00 for a can of milk

Feedstuff Prices

Arrangements are being made to get Prof. Leitch to work out a system of price reduction for cattle feedstuffs which might justify a reduction in the wholesale price of milk. Until such reduction is justified, however, the agreement reached by the committee will stand until April 30, 1920.

Major Duncan, in an interview to the press, made it clear that while citizens had been getting fifteen tickets for a dollar, the thirteen tickets for a dollar schedule was a winter schedule, commencing today and continuing until May.
