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NOTED VOCALIST CALLED BY DEATH

Atherton Bernard Furlong Succumbs to Relapse Following Pleurisy.

After an illness of two weeks, Atherton Bernard Furlong died yester-day afternoon at 2.30 o'clock at his late studio, college of vocal art, 352 Yonge street. The late Mr. Furlong was seized two weeks ago with an attack of pleurisy and on Sunday, feeling better, left his bed and during the night suffered a relapse, which caused his deat.. Mr. Furlong was born in Norway, Maine, 70 years ago. Nine years ago he came to Toronto and opened a col-lege of vocal art. He also conducted a similar studio in Miami, Florida, where he is very well known, which he conducted during the winter months.

LIFE IN LABRADOR


Or. Grenfell, Famous Doctor Mission-ary, Gives Illustrated Lecture at Convocation Hall.




