VETERANS

Items of Interest to Returned Soldiers Will Be Printed in This Column If Phoned or Sent In.

SOLDIERS DEMAND CANTINE PROFITS

Veterans' Organizations Consider Equal Distribution Only Fair Method.

If there have always been understood by the soldiers that they were to receive a direct share in the canteen profits, the news that Canada will receive \$35,000,000 from this source has caused much comment in veteran circles, to the effect that direct distribution to all who served in England and France is the only fair system, and that the Patriotic Fund should have no handling of the money. Officials report that 418,000 men were in the canteens, which would allow from \$80 to \$110 for each man, according to the basis of distribution.

"Let those who contributed to the fund share in it equally," was Provincial Secretary Turley's verdict. "Only the claims of the dependents of those who were killed will have to be remembered along with those who came back," added he.

"A little may go a long way, and this little will appear very strongly to every returned man from overseas," said Organizing Secretary H. E. Lewis.

Secretary J. V. Conroy of the district command was most emphatic upon the subject of not entrusting the administration of the fund to the Patriotic or any other civilian political organization.

"It would be disastrous," said he, "to allow the influence of either a political or any civilian body to decide how the money is to be disposed of."

Acting upon numerous requests from the membership of U.V.L. the following telegram was sent to Hon. Sydney Mewburn, whose department holds the funds:

"Returned soldiers of Toronto and Ontario request that the profit of the canteen be paid directly to the soldiers who served in France and England; also that the fund be distributed equally and paid as far as possible before Christmas. We protest against the Patriotic Fund's retention of this money, as it is the property of returned men."

G.W.V.A. REPUDIATES LEAGUE CANDIDATES

U.V.L., League and G.A.C. Cannot Understand Attitude of Association.

President G. R. Sweeney of the League of Veterans, F. W. Pritchard of the G.A.C. and J. Harry Flynn of the United Veterans' League, all take exception to the action of the G.W.V.A. in repudiating the candidates on the platform prepared by the League of Veterans on Monday night.

President G. R. Sweeney says: "The G.W.V.A. members present at the meeting Monday night repudiated their candidates, and they sent a letter to the league endorsing Col. Jesse Wright, which, at their request, was read at the opening of the meeting. The veterans are now wondering what is the reason for this latest move. Who is at the back of it and what is the object?"

The U.V.L. it is said, will retaliate by repudiation of all G.W.V.A. candidates, including Col. Jesse Wright. Their own slate will be published on December 25.
