The settlers of Brant held a meeting to dis-cuss-ways and means to build a mill at Maple Hill. But Joe, who was present, persuaded them to join with him and build one at Walkerton. He was ready with the ways and means, enthused the crowd and started a subscription on the spot. With indomitable energy, he led in the work and carried it thru to a successful finish. It was the beginning of Walkerton's greatness; this was in 1853. But in the preceding two years this indomit able man had worked hard. He had cleared the 12 acres on his four lots, dammed the river and built a sawmill. With a cluster of rude houses and a store it became a postoffice in 1852. In so brief a sketch, it is impossible to give all the chief events of Joe's life, for his biography is the history of the town. Suffice it to say that the great fight of his life began in 1857, when all the considerable villages of the County of Bruce contested for the county seat, and among them, Walker-

One bright day in the month of May, two men stood upon the summit midway on a rong, circling hill, and looked down upon a valley. Opposite to them was another lofty ridge, sweeping round to the west to join that upon which they stood, and form a woodland amphitheatre that challenged their admiration. 


